O.H.A. Makes Ruling Regarding City Players in Group 5

This year the heckling about the use of imported players reached a peak-until finally the O.H.A. came striding out of the mist "that surrounded the subject and clamped, a firm and decisive paw on teams and officials who would resort to this method of obtaining talent for individual club needs.

Group 5 of the Intermediate "B" series was the centre of such activity and special interest was given to Georgetown, Acton and Milton, who were held responsible for the tumult which arose.

Georgetown had been playing a host of talent from the Toronto Mercentile Leagues who, when classed with such squads as Elora, Orangeville, Fergus, etc. dwarfed these clubs into insignificance, especially on the point scoring. Milton had imported a few players from the Hamilton Industrial League and Acton were wondering if they could use Mooney and Evans who had recently starred in the Queen City.

These were the problems that faced the Ontario Hockey Association on Monday night and the solution they worked out is complimentary to the august body of sportsmen.

With regard to Georgetown - they could use these players from the T. H.L. loops, providing they were willing to assume an Intermediate "A" status. On the other hand they could throw out any such talent and still: revert back to "B" hockey. Georgetown took the first choice given by the O.H.A. (remains to be seen) and have elected to maintain an Intermediate "A"-team for this year.

This ruling applied to each club. Acton could use the services of Mooney and Evans if they wished - but they must step into Intermediate "A" Otherwise they would still retain "B" rating. The Hamilton imports were also classed as "A" players and Milton had the same choice which Acton and Georgetown enjoyed.


