Georgetown had been playing a host of talent from the Toronto Mercantile Leagues who, when classed with such squads as Elora, Orangeville, Fergus, etc. dwarfed these clubs into insignificance.

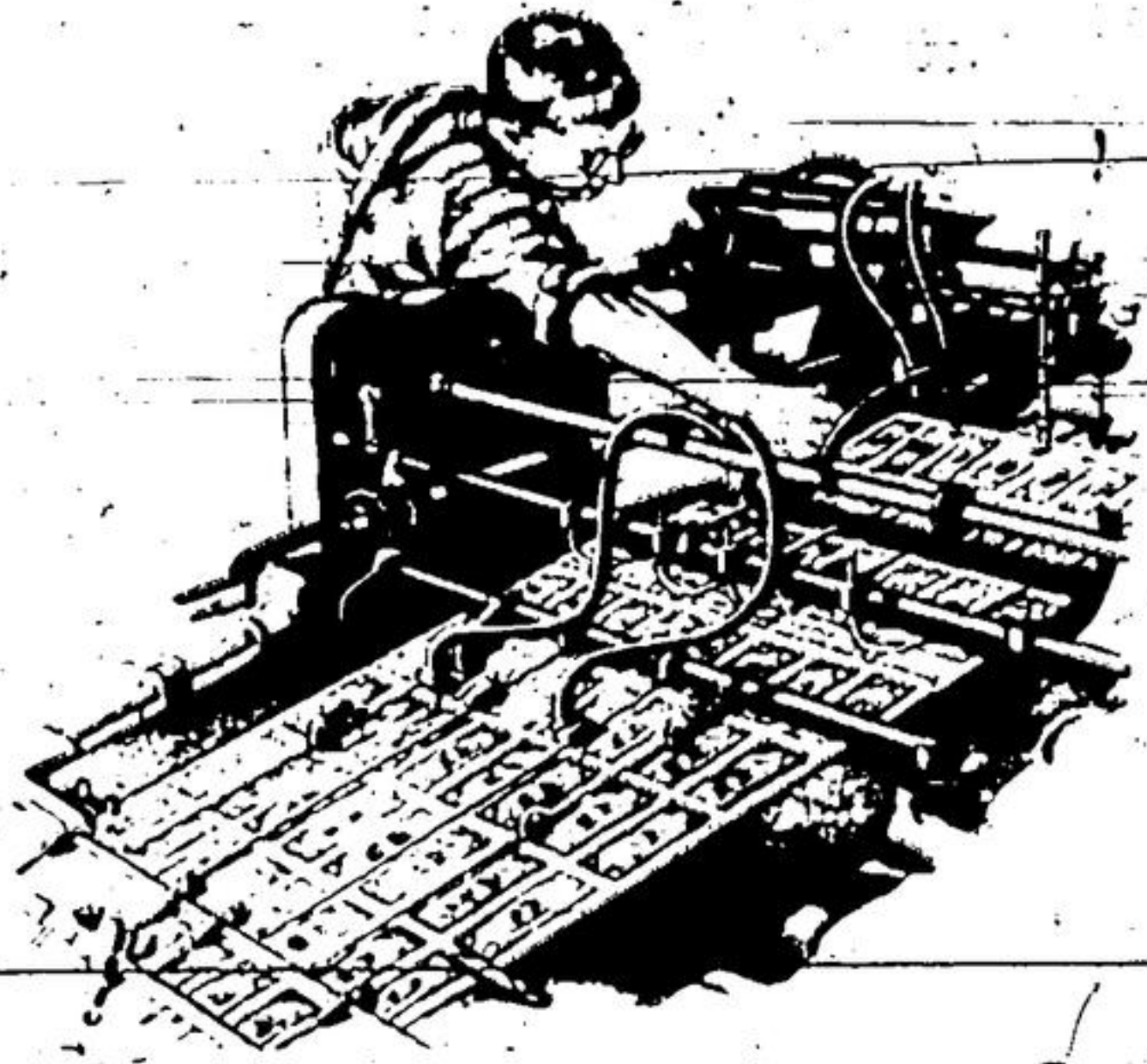
