Car Smashed as -Transport Skids At Highway Corner

Damage to the extent of \$300 was inflicted on a car owned by Albert Harris, Acton, when it was in collision with a tractor trailer owned by the Hamilton Transport Co. The accident occurred on Monday morning about eight, o'clock at the curve in No. 7 Highway at the west end of

Albert Harris with Mr. M. Shroed er, of Acton as a passenger, was travelling west while the transport was eastbound. 'As the transport swung around the curve the trailer jacknifed and swung completely across the highway blocking Harris' right-of-way. Harris pulled into the snow bank but the front of his car was struck. The mpact righted the trailer and knockof the Herris car crosswise of the road.
