A second generation. of Davidson Brothers took over in due course under the late Harlan Davidson and the present publisher, Waldo Davidson. The firm name, now a family tradition, continues.

The senior editor has retained through all these years a contribut-" ing and guiding interest in the paper he helped to build up almost from its beginning. He is still doing it. To have spent 63 years in editorial harness is, we believe, an unique record for any living journalist in the province and perhaps in all Canada. . SUPPLY FEED GRAINS NONE TOO GOOD

In several ways the feed situation in Canada as related to the 1946-47 winter-feeding seasion is similar to that in the corresponding period a year ago, according to the Canadian Coarse Grains Quarterly Review. On the basis of the second estimate of the 1946 field crops it is estimated that the over-all supply of feed grains in the Dominion for the 1946-47 season is only slightly larger than it was at this time in 1946.
