Artificial Light And Egg Yields

The stimulating effect of artificial light has long been recognized as a valuable aid to higher egg production during the winter period, but unlike all stimulants, it should be applied in moderation for the best results.

At the Dominion Experimental Station, Harrow, investigation into the value of lights left on all night has shown a greater frequency and persistence of broodiness as well as a lower egg yield among birds under all night lights than in the pens where light was provided to make a 14 hour day.

Whether lights are used in the morning before sunrise, or kept on after sunset to extend the feeding period to 14 hours makes no difference in the rate of increase. Both systems are and can be relied upon to improve production, provided the birds are in good condition and the feed is enough to extend over the extra time.

As the egg laying for the day is usually finished by late afternoon under an evening-lighting system closing the nests at the time of the last meal of scratch grain, which should be about two hours before the lights go off, and tends to lessen the degree of broodiness among birds which are predisposed to the trouble.

Because chickens like most other birds, have the instinct and means to sleep comfortably on a perch, the use of a dimming device with evening lights provides the signal to seek their resting place in an orderly manner before darkness comes.

When an automatic switch is used to turn the lights off early in the morning and the birds are allowed to retire with the sun, scratch grain to provide warming food and exercise should be put in the pens after dark during the period prior to chore time the following morning.

As a general rule, the feeding times should be adjusted to the lengthened day to offset the dangers that may result from extended periods without attention.
