

### Halton Presbytery Has Many Items At 1947 Meeting

The first regular meeting for 1947 of Halton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada was held recently in St. Paul's United Church, Milton, with Rev. A. W. Fosbury in the

The members were favored especsecretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service, when he spoke on behalf of the Crusade Committee on the subject "The Evangelical Use of the Christian Pulpit." The speaker remilided his hearers that the living word 'Christ' must be at the center, please attend early. Both stock and of preaching if it is to be evangelical and that preaching is the chief means by which Christianity has spread. There must be a note of urgency about preaching with its setting in the proclamation of the Word. It is proer to appeal to the emotions as wel as to the intellect. Doctrinal preaching has the most lasting results. Preaching must be related to people in this age and it needs to come from

the 'heart strangely warmed.' Rev. B. W. Hall, the new minister at Trafalgar was introduced and welcomed to the fellowship of the

Presbytery. Rev. Gordon Porter, as convenor of the Crusade Committee stressed the need and effectiveness of Communicant Classes and Visitation Evangelism as means of winning people to the Kingdom.

Emphasis was placed on 'Religion in the Home' by the convenor of the Committee on Christian Education, Rev. R. C. Todd. The local churches cannot do their best work without the aid and co-operation of the home.

Three galloping Standard Training Schools are being held within the Presbytery at the present time and many of our people are taking advantage of the opportunity to prepare for leadership. One school is travelling around the northern area of the Presbytery, one around the western and one around the southern areas.

The total givings of the charges to the Missionary and Maintenance Fund for 1940 are above the 1945 givings by \$780.

Rev. R. R. Hare, on behalf of the Committee on Evangelism and Social Service, presented resolutions which were adopted relating to the promotion of more effective Temperance Education in the Sunday Schools by the use of films, pasters, etc. and the conservation of food and grain in view of the world food shortages. Presbytery recorded its disapproval of frequent drinking scenes in movies, the discrepancy in taxes on beer and soft drinks, whereby beer drinkers are taxed less than those who use soft drinks, resolution was passed urging willer education in relation to the control of and reduction of Venereal Diseases.
