CLEAN SEED MEANS PROFIT TO FARMERS

ans (A) goal. All seeds require thorough cleaning and grading to remove weed seeds and offal, as well as light and shrunken kernels. Both experience and experiments have demonstrated the fact that the largest yield per acre may be expected from the use of large, sound, plump seed rather than from seed which has been poorly cleaned

In many places in Canada there are well-equipped seed cleaning plants available to farmers, but it may so happen that these seed cleaning establishments may not be conveniently near some of the farmers whose only alternative is to clean their own seed The farm-sized fanning mill, however can do a good job if carefully operated Improper cleaning of seed is due in most cases to lack of proper "sieves or screens, or to improper adaptation of the mill. Some of the weed seeds are difficult; to separate, but most of them can be removed it proper sieves are used and time is taken to determine the proper combination of size and slope of sieve. shake, air blast and rate at which the send passes over the steves
