DARK EGG YOLKS

Feeding experiments with Barred Rock Pullets at the Dominion Experimental Station, Harrow, Ont. have shown that due to the nature of the diet, quantities of succulent green feed, such as out and steeped alfalfa hav, have a tendency to intensify the color of egg yolks. Eggs with rich colored yolks are now favored in the overseas market because a darker volk is generally accepted as an indication of a satisfactory diet and the presence of valuable food factors, notably Vitamin A.
