COOK A MEAL IN FIVE MINUTES

A United Kingdom firm is now manufacturing a radio oven which will cook a complete meal in five minutes or less. HEREDITARY DEAFNESS

Throughout his working life a teacher of the deaf, Alexander Graham Bell gave much thought to the national consequences of bad handling of the deaf-mute problem. When Bell began his work, many thought that deaf people could never communicate in a normal manner with their fellow men. Children who could not learn to talk, because they could not hear, were sent to institutions when they were about twelve, to learn the sign language, so that they could communicate with other deaf mutes. As a result, deaf mutes met and communicated only with other deaf mutes and selected their mates from people with the same affliction. The number of congenitally deaf children produced by such marriage was alarming. Bell wrote a pamphlet warning that a deaf variety of the human race was being formed, and such an outcome could be avoided only by teaching deaf children to talk and lip-read. The fact that this danger has been largely averted is in part due to the work of Alexander Graham Bell.
