The farm is well watered by a spring creek at the back of the farm and the water is piped to both house and barn.

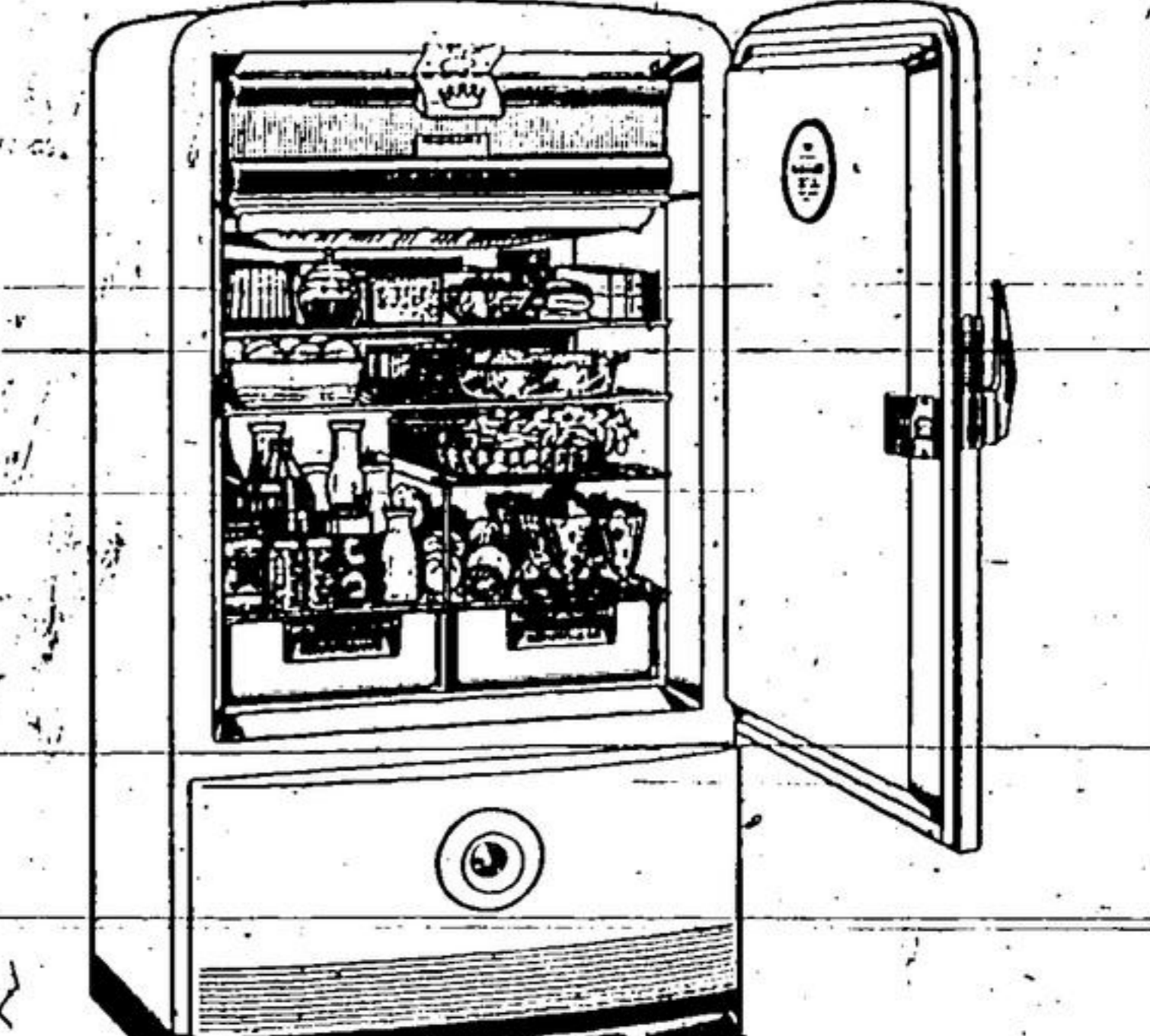
