Obituary

ALFRED WALTER FOSBURY, Sr. Shortly after mid-night on Tuesday, March 25th, there passed away in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, Alfred Walter Fosbury, Sr. Mr. Fosbury had suffered a paralytic stroke in August, 1945 and had been confined to bed from that time right up until his passing. This long illness was terminated peacefully, when he passed from death to life.

Mr. Fosbury was born on June 3rd, 1870 in Alton, Hampshire, England and came to Canada in June of the year 1913. The rest of the family, with the exception of the eldest son, Frank, and the youngest son Tolbert, who was born in this country, followed him to Canada in October of that same year.

For some years previous to Church Union he was a member of, and served as an officer in Mount Forest Wellington Street Methodist Church and after union, became an elder in the United Church of that town. As a teacher in the Church School and as a leader of a Trill Ranger Group and a Cub Troop, he showed an active interest in the younger boys of the community.

Having served as a soldier in the Imperial Army before coming to Canada, he also proved himself to be a good soldier of the Christian Faith after coming to the Dominion. He served quietly yet effectively, wherever he felt called upon to do so. His passing was, therefore, a victory rather than a defeat.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his wife, Annie Elizabeth White, four sons, Frank of Boston and New York, Walter of Acton, Dennis and Robert of Toronto, and two daughters, Nellie (Mrs. Harvey Wood) of Stratford, and Edith (Mrs. Arthur Grant) of Collingwood. One daughter, Lily (Mrs. Oscar Lewis), predeceased him in December, 1944.

The funeral service was conducted in the Johnstone & Rumley Funeral Home at Acton on Friday, March 28th by Rev. G. W. Porter of St. Paul's United Church, Milton. Interment was made in Avondale Cemetery, Stratford, Ontario.

The meeting of the United Church Y.P.U. was held in the Sunday School room on Monday night with the president, Joanna Shortill, presiding. Eleanor Beatty had charge of the meeting, using as her theme "Losing Life to Find It." After the business, the meeting closed with the benediction and lunch followed.
