#### HALTON CREAM PRODUCERS-PLAN MEETING IN MILTON

The price being received by creamery shippers in relation to the returns for milk going to the whole milk markets is a source of dissatisfaction to the former group. The increased price of feeding stuffs and the scarcity of farm labor are two of the main reasons for the shortage of butter in Canada. The creamery producers of Ontario have given the matter a good deat of study and have prepared a scheme which if approved will come under the Farm Products Marketing Act for Ontario. In orderto have an opportunity of becoming familiar with the proposed scheme we understand from Frank Wilson, of Ashgrove, Chairman of the Halton Cream Producers' Association, that a meeting is being held in the Court House, Milton, on Friday, April 11th;

A representative of the Ontarlo Creamery, Producers' Association will be in attendance to explain the proposed scheme. At the same time all Halton creamery producers will have an oportunity of registering as producers and voting on the proposed scheme.
