The scars of war are very evident in most places and many of the finest towns will be years before the effects of war are effaced. Some towns, such as Southampton, Portsmouth and Plymouth have their main streets absolutely obliterated for many blocks.

During his stay he visited many of England's finest cathedrals, such as Winchester, Chester, Westminster, St. Paul's and Durham and many places of historical interest, such as the Tower of London, Tower Bridge, Hampton Court Palace, House of Parliament, Buckingham Palace and Kew Gardens.

It was the worst winter that old England had experienced for a century, what with the tremendous snow storms, severe frosts and then to cap it all, the really terrible floods. Upon the approach of an ambulance, Fire or Police Department Vehicle upon which a bell or siren is sounding, Every Driver shall immediately bring his Vehicle to a Stand Still as near as is practicable to the right hand Curb or Edge of the Roadway and parallel therewith and clear of any intersections.

(18) No Vehicle shall follow any Fire Department Vehicle when proceeding to an alarm at a distance of less than five hundred feet.

PENALTY- Anyone who violates the provisions of the above shall incur a penalty of not more than \$100.00. For the second offence a penalty of not less than \$100.00 and not more than \$250.00 and for any subsequent offence not less than \$250.00 and in addition his license or permit may be suspended for any period not exceeding 60 days.
