Notice!
Section 39 (17) of the Highway Traffic Act is hereby drawn to the attention of all drivers of vehicles:
Upon the approach of an ambulance, Fire or Police Department Vehicle, or Public Utility Emergency Vehicle upon which a bell or siren is sounding, Every Driver shall immediately bring his Vehicle to a Stand Still as near as is practicable to the right hand curb or Edge of the Roadway and parallel therewith and clear of any intersections.
(18) No Vehicle shall follow any Fire Department Vehicle when proceeding to an alarm at a distance of less than five hundred feet.
PENALTY—Anyone who violates the provisions of the above shall incur for the first offence a penalty of not more than \$10.00. For the Second Offence a penalty of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.00 and for any Subsequent Offence not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$50.00 and in addition his license or permit may be suspended for any period not exceeding 60 days.
PARKING:
No vehicle shall be parked within 6 feet of a fire hydrant or within 25 ft. of a fire hall on the side of the street on which the Fire Hall is located or within 100 feet of the Fire Hall on the opposite side of the street.
