RESULTS OF EXPERIMENTS

Many persons are deterred from things they might accomplish by the fear of failure, and the idea that they never did anything of that sort before. It seems a wise plan to show some willingness to try new experiences.

If one has doubts as to whether he can accomplish some desirable objective, he can look at an attempt to do that thing as a useful experiment that will help him however it turns out. If he makes a success at it, it will be a long step in advance. If not, he will have obtained ideas that will help him in future undertakings. People's powers grow as they test them out in untried situations, and they become able to handle more difficult propositions.

BODY MAINTENANCE

Comparing the human body with man made machines, health officers at Canada's capital point out that, although the body has no "trade-in" value, it has many advantages over mere machines, and, with care, will last longer, be "more" flexible and more responsive.

"To keep yourself in good running order, you need adequate food, rest and recreation, and, of course, fresh air and exercise," say the doctors. They recommend a study of "Canada's Food Rules" for guidance on human "fuel", and remind Canadians that meals should include sensible mixtures of the five major food groups, milk, fruits, vegetables, cereals and fish or meat.

Erin Council Ask Halton County to Improve 7th Line

Daylight Saving Time to be in Effect with Surrounding Centres

Erin Township Council met at Hillsburg on Wednesday, April 2nd, at the call of the Reeve. All members were present, the Reeve presiding.

Resolutions that the ratepayers of S.S. No. 1 be refunded 3.5 mills on their 1946 tax levy on their Assessment for that year, owing to over levy by School Trustees. No refund to be made until 1946 taxes have been paid. The Treasurer was authorized to make the refund.

Policy No. 22017 of the Pilot Insurance was renewed on Maintainer and Equipment for \$20,000, \$10,000 and \$3,000 plus Fire and Theft. Premium of \$56.61 through the Agency of Frank D. Gray.

The Assessor was authorized to distribute 1947 dog tags and keep a record of same.

Brook, Davis & Dunn, auditors were paid for Township Audit \$200.00 for audit and \$6.20 tax verification notices.

The Council requested the Halton County Council to consider the advisability of hard-topping the Seventh Line, of Esquewing Township from Highway No. 7 to the boundary of Erin Township as a large percentage of the heavy traffic from the north passes over this road which at present is in very bad condition. Clerk was authorized to forward a copy of this resolution to the Clerk of Halton County.
