
AGRIC. SUBSIDIES AT \$351,476,126

From September 1, 1939 to January 31, 1947, a total of \$351,476,126 way pald by the Dominion-Covernment-ax agriculture subsidies, according to a statement filed recently in the ·House of Commons by the Right Hon. James G. Gardiner, Dominion Minister of Agriculture. The largest item in the total was \$84,104,622 paid for butter fat used for creamery butter. Next was \$79,821,521 for Areight assistance on western feed grains, nullfeeds and screenings shipped to farmers in Eastern Canada and British Columbia for feeding live stock. Third was \$44,451,049 on milk for fluid consumption. .. Payments for the premiums on hogs, which started first at \$3 for hogs grading A1 and \$2 for those grading Bl, then later dropped . to \$2 and \$1 respectively, amounted to \$31,242,944. Prairie farm income payments absorbed \$18,978,993, the outpointing the rampagious Redmen subsidies on apples totalled \$14,409,-632 and payments on milk used for cheddar cheese were - \$14,221,570. Altogether there were 31 Items on which subsidies were paid.

Section 39 (17) of the Highway Traffic Act is hereby drawn to the attention of all drivers of vehicles:

"Upon the approach of an ambulance, Fire or Police Department Vohicle, or Public Utility Emergency Vehicle upon which a bell or Siren is sounding, Every Driver shall immediately bring his Vehicle to a Stand Still as near as is practicable to the right hand-Curb or Edge of the Roadway and parallel thetewith and clear of any intersections.


(18) No. Vehicle, shall follow any Fire Department Vehicle when proceeding to an plarm at a disfance of less than five hundred

PENALTY' Anyone who violates the provisions of the above shall incur for the first offence a penalty of not more than \$10.00. For the Second Offence a penalty of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$25.00 and for any Subsequent Offence not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$50.00 and in addition his license or permit may be suspended for any period not exceeding 60 days; --

PARKING:

No vehicle shall be parked within 6 feet of a fire hydrant or within 25 ft. of a fire hall on the side of the street on which the Fire Hall is located or within 100 feet of the Fire Hall on the opposite side of the street.
