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## Halton County Has First Music Festival Since War

Following a four year interval in which the Halton Music Festival was discontinued during the war years, the 16th Featival was held in Knox Presbyterinn Church, Milton last Thursday and Friday.

Although the crowd was not what was expected during the afternoon session, the auditorium was packed to capacity for the evening. As honors were evenly divided among the different county schools on the first day, Nassagaweya Township scoring with honors on the second day.

There were not as many entries as in pre-war years, but officials said this was due to the discontinuance during the war years. J. A. Lockhart, treasurer, explained that instrumental numbers were not included on the program-this year but the compctition covered all phases of music as taught in the schools.

# Held at the Junior Farmers' Gathering

Group of 17 Young People From Halton Take Part in Ceremony at Guelph

At an impressive, induction cercmony held in Memorial Hall, on the campus of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, Inst Monday, in conjunction with the Ontario Junior Farmer Conference, seventeen young men and women from all parts of Halton County repeated the oath of Allegiance and were presented with Canadian Citizenship certificates by His County of Halton.

The ceremony followed a series of five citizenship meetings held at Paiermo, Acton and Ashgrove during the month of March. 
