Obituary

MRS. JOHN KINNARD - In her ninetieth year death came suddenly to Mrs. John Kinnaird at Drampton last Friday. Although falling, she was quite active. In spite of her advanced years and was about as usual the morning of her death and enjoyed her usual health.

Mrs. Kinnaird was before marriage, Rebecca Sprawl, a daughter of the late John Sprawl and Jane Cummings. She was born on the Second Line in Esquewagh Township and spent her life in this district. Until thirty-six years ago Mr. and Mrs. Kinnaird conducted the farm in Esquewagh and since retiring have resided in Guelph and Drampton. Her husband predeceased her five years ago. Of the family, one brother, James of Esquewagh is the only surviving member.

The funeral was held on Monday afternoon with service at the Johnstone and Rumley Funeral Home in Acton, in charge of Rev. J. M. Anderson, minister of Knox Church, Acton of which Mrs. Kinnaird was a member for many years. Here many friends gathered in tribute to her memory. Interment was made in Fairview Cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. Everett Donny, Allan Dixon, Lorne Mullin, G. W. Sprawl, John Sprawl and Earl Sprawl.

ALEXANDER BELL - Native of Nasasagweya Township and son of early pioneers of this district, Alexander Bell passed away on Monday, April 14th at his home on Knox Avenue in his 91st year. He had been in failing health for the past two and one half years.

Alexander Bell was a son of Thomas and Rachel Bell, natives of Antrim, Ireland, who came as pioneers to Canada and settled in Nasasagweya Township. He spent the early years of his life on the homestead and operated lumber and saw mills and was the third generation to carry on this work on the homestead.

In 1902 he came to Acton and purchased the sawmill from James Brown and operated this mill for eight years, retiring from business in 1910. In his busy and successful business life he also served in Nasasagweya and in Acton on the Municipal Councils and took a keen and practical interest in the community. He served well his Church and was a member of the Board of Managers of Knox Presby-

terian Church for many years. In the passing of Alexander Bell, the community loses a staunch citizen who served with his day and generation. He is survived by his widow Susan Bilco and two daughters, Miss Pearl of home and Mrs. J. C. Leslie (widow) of Calgary. In their bereavement they have the sympathy of many friends. An only son, Perry Lincoln, died in infancy.

The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon of last week with service at the home on Knox Avenue conducted by his minister, Rev. J. M. Anderson of Knox Church. Many friends gathered in tribute and many floral tributes bore testimony of esteem and sympathy. Interment was made in Fairview Cemetery, Acton. The pallbearers were Messrs. Thos. Blair McMillan, Jeremiah Bell, J. J. Reid, Thos. Cargill, Harold Bell and Wilfred Kennedy.
