Obituary

EVAN JONES

Resident of Acton for the past fifty-five years, former member of Council and well-known citizen of Acton. Evan Jones passed away at St. Joseph's Hospital in Guelph on Wednesday of last week. He had been ill for the past two or three weeks and a patient in the hospital. A native of Wales, Mr. Jones came to Acton about thirty-five years ago. He was engaged in construction work when the Bendmore siding of the C.N.R. was built to the plant and has throughout the years since been engaged as teamster with J. B. MacKenzie and on other work in the community. Last year he purchased the Duncan McDougall farm and had carried on farm work until ill health stopped his activity.

For several terms Mr. Jones served on Acton Council and was one of the first Board of Acton YMCA. He took a keen and active interest in his church work and was a member of the Board of Stewards for many years and taught a class in the Sunday School, was Church treasurer and treasurer of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund in the United Church. He served willingly and well in whatever capacity he was called upon and will indeed be missed, not only in the church but the community as a whole. His industry and integrity were a splendid example of good citizenship. He is survived by his wife, formerly Elizabeth Masters and one son, Frank. The funeral was held on Friday afternoon with service at the Johnstone & Rumley Funeral Home, conducted by his pastor, Rev. A. W. Fosbury. Here many friends gathered to tribute to a life they admired. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery, Acton. The pallbearers were: Messrs. J. H. Reed, Thos. Watson, R. H. Elliott, A. T. Brown, Orwell Johnston and C. W. Mason.

MRS. G. G. ROBERTSON

There passed away on Saturday, April 26th at the Guelph General Hospital Clara Jane Jackson, widow of the late George Gray Robertson of Everton in her 71st year.

Although not enjoying the best of health for the past few years, she was able to be about until a week previous when she suffered two severe strokes and was removed to the hospital where amid loving care and attention she passed peacefully away.

She was born and raised on the farm on the Second Line of Erin, now owned by her brother, Norman. Upon her marriage to George G. Robertson in 1896 they moved to Everton where her husband was a blacksmith until his death in 1930.

Always ready to lend a helping hand she proved herself a good neighbor, a true and kind friend. Her hands were never idle, and for a number of years she was a successful exhibitor at several local fall fairs. A devout member of the Everton Church of Christ Disciples, her church and her family were uppermost in her mind.

The funeral, held on Tuesday, April 29th, with a private service at the Johnstone and Rumley Funeral Home, Acton, followed by a public service at the Everton Church was largely attended with Rev. W. Charlton, conducting the services. Miss Blanche McKinnon sang a favorite of the deceased, "The Old Rugged Cross." The members of the Everton Women's Institute of which Mrs. Robertson was a former member, attended in a body.

The numerous floral tributes, were carried by two grandsons, Douglas and Kenneth Robertson, a nephew, Leslie Jackson and three neighbors, Messrs. Hurvey, Justin, Harold Sunter and Joseph Benham. Interment was at Everton Cemetery with Messrs. T. D. McCutcheon, W. H. Jortop, Col. Head, A. Boles, P. R. Peavoy and Charles Hamilton acting as pallbearers.

Left to mourn a loving mother are two daughters, Mrs. Elmer Pfann (Jessie), Buffalo, N.Y.; Mrs. George M. Young (Pearl) Erin Township; three sons, David G. of Ospringe; Norman W. of Acton and Lloyd G. of Guelph. Seven grandchildren and two brothers, William J.
