Members endorsed a resolution to be forwarded to the Department of Lands and Forests recommending that the day's catch of speckled trout be reduced from 20 to 10 with a pound-size limit of five pounds instead of ten. They were informed a similar regulation was in force in Brant county.

A letter from the County Assessor gave information regarding enlarging copies of the map of Acton for purpose of assessment. Further information was to be secured.

Notification was received of the amount on deposit in the sinking fund account and the amount owing this year.

A letter from the Department of Planning gave information regarding new surveys.

A letter was read from Dr. D. A. Garrett on behalf of the Acton, Milton and Georgetown Public Health Nurse Committee asked that \$200 be paid now to this committee. This year the levy would only be half former years in view of the fact that the County Unit would be in operation by July 1st. The whole amount of \$386.00 owing was to be paid now.

A letter from W. J. Robertson, sheriff of Halton County, recommended that a steel bunk be put in the town lock-up.

A letter from F. L. Wright gave details of the increased coverage of insurance that had been recommended. The increased premium on this coverage was \$141.50. A motion was passed authorizing the Treasurer to pay this amount.

Chief Harrop reported that the municipal dump was filled and a new site should be secured. Mr. Harrop was requested to make arrangements if possible for new land and report to the next meeting of Council.

The Clerk reported that Mr. Bowman, surveyor had completed his survey of the Wartime Housing property.

The LETTER BOX

Dear Editor:

A newcomer to Acton, the thing that impresses me most is that the town has a Y.M.C.A. I have lived in towns with and without a Y. This first hand experience has made me an ardent disciple of Y'sdom. Those people who cast petty criticisms at the Y and its work are people, I have found, who have nothing better to offer, as a rule. If the problems of modern youth were left in their hands, God help them!

A convincing answer to such criticisms was, in my opinion, given at the Y Work Display at the Arena last Friday evening. Here were groups of Acton young people, from preschool to teen age and over, displaying in a disciplined, happy way skills acquired after months of training. This training moulds character along with the physique, develops responsibility and self-respect. Yet many prominent citizens were absent only sprinkling of members of the School Board, Town Council and, indeed, not too many of the Y's Men themselves. Indifference does more to kill good work in a town than ill-informed criticism.

With so many groups and organizations in a community tending to divide it into sections, it is a blessing to find one like a Y.M.C.A. capable of encouraging unity, particularly at the adult and teen-age level. What we need in this town is a bigger and better Y.M.C.A. and a quenching of the carping criticism that has nothing better to offer.

As I went home from the display, I passed by the Beer Parlour where a babble of voices could be heard and the stench of beer floated out into the street. It occurred to me that more money had probably been spent on beer that night than had been taken in at the door of the Arena. With the Y badly in need of more space and facilities, a little sacrifice of time and pleasure and a dash of genuine interest by the rank and file could do wonders for the young people growing up in this crowded town.

Maybe the whole business should start with Adult Education. Then we might reach some of the people who, drawing good pay cheques, are still willing to abandon our young people to the pool room, beer parlour, automobile, dance hall, street corner and commercialized entertainment.
