Besides her husband she is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Lenora Sawyer, Mrs. Fred Comber (Arlene), Mrs. Elwood Gibson (Betty), all of London and four grandchildren and two sisters, Mrs. Jas. A. Greene of Guelph and Mrs. Earle Brown of Kitchener.

The funeral service was conducted on Tuesday, May 20 from the Cliff Evans Funeral Home, Hamilton Road, London at 3.30 p.m. by Rev. Glenn Wardell. Interment was made in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, London.

DONALD DUFF

Funeral services for Donald Duff of Thornloe were held on Saturday afternoon from the Perrin Funeral Chapel and the Hanbury United Church. Mr. Duff was 76 years of age and his death came after an illness which had lasted about a year.

Born in Erin Township, the county of Wellington, Mr. Duff was the son of the late John Duff and Elizabeth Stewart Duff. He came to this district in 1908 and for many years he was in the lumber business. Later he became interested in farming and he took an active part in the affairs of the community and was an ardent supporter of the Temiskaming Crop Improvement Association.

Georgetown Youth Committed for Trial Milton Police Court

Dogs at Large and Drunks on the Loose Contribute to Court Fines

Victor Ostrander, 17-year-old High School student was sent up for trial when he appeared before Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon, in County Magistrate's Court here yesterday. Ostrander is charged with attempted rape on a 14-year-old Georgetown High School girl earlier this month.

William Nelson, charged with vagrancy, was remanded a week on request of Chief Lee J. Smith of Burlington. Bail was set at \$200.

Donald Howell, 28, of Saltfleet Township, convicted a week ago on a charge of stealing two radiators from Thomas Patterson, a Trafalgar Township plumber, was placed on suspended sentence for six months. He was ordered to pay the court costs of \$20.50 or in default an additional 15 days in jail. He was convicted a week ago and kept in custody a week for sentence.

Oliver Hull was ordered to pay a fine of \$1 and costs of \$1 when he failed to appear in court. He was charged with an infraction of a town by-law, namely allowing his dog to run at large. Chief Canning was the complainant.

Norman Corp, 17, was ordered to pay a fine of \$10 and costs of \$8 or 30 days when he pleaded guilty to a charge of being intoxicated in a public place. "You didn't serve in the army and according to the act a person under 21 is not entitled to have liquor," the Magistrate declared.

According to Chief Canning, he found the accused in an intoxicated condition in the United Church shed last Saturday night.

A charge of having seven bottles of beer in an illegal place against Danilo Zanetti, 16, Milton Heights, was dismissed, when the court ruled there was "a doubt, and the accused is entitled to that doubt."

James Collins and Leon Durocher, pleaded guilty to a charge of being intoxicated on Main St., each paid \$10 and costs and \$15 and costs respectively. Chief Canning was the complainant.

The court dismissed a charge of neglecting her children against Eva Ackerman, declaring "there is direct controversy of evidence. You are entitled to the benefit of the doubt." Chief Constable Canning said he found the accused in a local beverage room after receiving a complaint that children were crying in a car. Mrs. Ackerman said she went in with a friend and had just sat at a table when the Chief Constable arrived.

A similar charge against George Forbes and Mrs. Ackerman was withdrawn on request of Crown Attorney Dick when he had no evidence to offer.
