Obituary

JOHN THOMAS KING—On Sunday morning, May 25th, the people of this community were shocked to learn of the sudden death of John Thomas King an old and highly respected citizen of Hornby. Born June 3rd, 1859, the late Mr. King was a remarkable example of a genial kindly gentleman. He had a happy faculty of making friends easily and endearing himself to those with whom he came in contact, by his forthright honesty and open candour. Physically active and mentally alert he thoroughly enjoyed his evening of life. He was the last of a generation of eight children born to the late Samuel and Jane King, natives of Ireland, who settled in Hornby over a century ago. He was reared in a household where industry and strict parental obedience were inculcated with a strict observance of the Shorter Catechism. He was personally a staunch Presbyterian, honest in his convictions and loyal to the tenets of his faith.

In 1890, John King married Mary Graham and continued to farm the homestead on which he was born, until his retirement from active work in 1930. To John and Mary were

born four boys and a girl. Reared in an atmosphere of truth and moral rectitude, they were taught to honor in strict observance, the tenets of Christian faith, of an elder of the Presbyterian church and today are grown to manhood and womanhood, in the person of Dr. J. L. King of Galt, Dr. G. A. King of Milton, Erle King of Toronto and Russell G. King of Hornby and Queenie Galbraith of Hornby, to survive and hold dear, the memory of a beloved father. Mary Graham King predeceased her husband in 1916.

The funeral service was held with simple dignity in the late home of the deceased, on Tuesday, May 27th, 1947, and the remains interred in the Presbyterian Cemetery. Funeral and burial rites were conducted by Rev. J. Walker of Galt, Rev. J. N. McFaul of Oakville and Rev. G. W. Porter of Milton. The pallbearers were Dr. William Jones of Toronto, Kenneth MacMillan of Georgetown, and Archie King, Clebert McDougall, Lindsay Neelands and Charles Galbraith of Hornby. In addition to the friends and neighbors of the community, a number of friends and relatives were present from Galt, Toronto, Milton and Georgetown.

And now the closing scene, a little child is leading them, the grandchildren, Leslie King and Margaret Galbraith of Hornby, Mary Joan, Jack and Lenore King of Milton and Kathleen King of Galt, as they wend their way in single file to lay their flowers on "Grandpa's" grave.

Field Representative In Acton Discusses Board of Trade

C. K. Bantock, Field Service Representative of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce was in Acton for a few hours last week to discuss the re-activation of the Acton Board of Trade. He pointed out that many towns were becoming community conscious and expanding through the activities of their Boards of Trade. Within the past year 210 Boards of Trade have formed in towns from Coast to Coast. At present affiliated with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, there are 369 Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce. Mr. Bantock said Board of Trade activities are essentially community building, recognizing the four interests of any town namely Commerce, Industry, Agriculture and Civic. "There are many problems facing business men to-day both from a community and National standpoint which can only be met by the forward thinking citizens of a town. Membership in a Board of Trade is open to any town citizen who is interested in the community welfare."

Mr. Bantock explained that the Canadian Chamber of Commerce is a federation of all Boards and Chambers across the Dominion and is responsible for interpreting the voice of business to the Government at the national level.

HALTON JUNIORS ORGANIZE CALF AND SWINE CLUBS

The organization meeting for Halton's two Calf Clubs and Boys' and Girls' Swine Club was recently held in the Court House, Milton, with some 60 Club members in attendance. Ten young people, each with a pair of pure bred Yorkshire weanling sow pigs have enrolled in the Swine Club. The following officers were elected: President, Wm. Brain, Norval; Vice President, Geo. Burkholder, Freeman; Secretary, Harold Tyrrell, Freeman; Club Leader, Mr. Percy Merry, Hornby. In Calf Club work, this year's program includes the following Clubs or special sections: (1) Milton Holstein Calf Club, (2) Halton Calf Club, which includes one section for Jersey and Guernsey junior heifer calves, and a second section for baby beef calves.

In all, some 38 young people between the ages of 12 and 20 years have enrolled in this project. With Agric. Rep. J. E. Milton Holstein Calf Club—President, Wm. Brain, Norval; Vice President, Lorna Lawrence, Oakville; Secretary Treasurer, Anita Peer, Milton; Club Leaders, Messrs. A. T. Woodley, W. H. Robinson and Morley Watson. Wm. T. Dales of Campbellville addressed the young people giving a most interesting and educational resume of a recent trip through southern United States.
