New Wage Rate For Employees of Wool Combing

The Management of Wool Combing Corporation of Canada Limited, and the Textile Workers' Union of America, announce that following negetlations between the two parties they have agreed upon an amendment to the Collective Burgaining Agreement now in effect:

. This ammendment, relating to the wage schedule of the agreement, provides for an increase of 5c per hour in the starting rate for new employees.

It further stipulates that all em-"ployees who have completed three months of-service with the Company shall receive the full rate for the job. At present, employees are required to stay with the company for mine months before the maximum rate is

paid. The provisions of this amendment. are to come into effect on June 1st. 1947, and shall apply to male and female employees alike.
