1000 Attend Field Day For Halton in Milton Park

Nassagaweya Won Inter-Township Trophy — Palermo Won the Inter-Club Event — Keen Contest in Races — Oldest Lady and Gentleman Get Special Awards

Ideal weather favored nearly 1,000 school children, parents and Junior Farmers, who attended the second annual Halton Federation of Agriculture field day, held at Agricultural Park, in Milton, last Saturday morning and afternoon.

Never in the history of the park has there been such an array of athletes and budding sportsmen. They were there from all parts of the county to take part in races for the children of pre-school age and up to the oldest. Children from twenty schools competed in the softball tournament and field events while the Junior Farmers held their annual track events in conjunction with the affair, to select winners to represent the county at the Ontario field day being held later this month at Guelph.

Nassagaweya Township won top honors in various events, taking the trophy for a second consecutive time when they won the Inter-Township Softball Contest. They won the Milton District Co-operative cup by defeating Nelson nine, 15 to 11, in the fastest game of the day. In the first round Nassagaweya trounced Esquesing 7-3, while Nelson had a closer contest with Trafalgar, 7 to 7.

Boys and girls and even their teachers cheered their teams till they could hardly speak during the elimination contests in the rural public school softball tournament. Six ball diamonds were in constant use. Nassagaweya huskies from S.S. 4 and S.S. 5 combined to outclass the entire field and win the Milton Milling Company trophy by defeating the Palermo Munn's and Trafalgar aggregation. Several schools unable to field a team with sufficient numbers of players combined with their neighboring school or schools to enter the tournament. Results of the rounds in the tournaments were: Kilmorie, Cedar Springs combination eliminated the Lovville, Limestone and Bell's crowd. Palermo, Ash, Munn's, Trafalgar 16, nosed-out Bronte in a close contest. Nassagaweya 4 and 5 handed their neighbors Nassagaweya S.S. 7, 8 and 9 a sound trouncing. Trafalgar 3B beat Tuck's, Nelson, and Mount Nemo gang.

261 Members in Halton Co-operative Medical Services

The first members meeting of the Halton Co-operative Medical Services held in the Court House, Milton on Thursday last was well attended by a large majority of the members.

Paul Fisher gave the report of the provisional Board of Directors and presented the Provincial Charter which gives to the newly formed Co-operative the Sanction and approval of the Province of Ontario. He also read the by-laws recommended by the provisional Board which were approved by the meeting.

The Secretary reported a membership of 261 with a total paid premium of \$3,662. This membership is made up of nineteen organized groups in Halton County.

The By-Laws provide for the election of twelve directors, four to serve for three years, four for two years and four for one year. Those elected for 1947-8-9 were Paul A. Fisher, Wm. T. Dales, Milton J. Brown and Mrs. L. Crawford; for 1947-8, Miss Florence Meares, Mrs. Chester Service, Mr. R. Sawgirth and Councillor Wm. R. Hume and for 1947 Mrs. Arthur Spencer, Mrs. Joe Wickon, George Robertson and H. E. Bathin.

Following the members meeting the newly elected Directors met and elected Paul A. Fisher, president and Milton J. Brown, Vice President. A permanent Secretary will be appointed at the next meeting of the Directors. H. S. Heatherington, provisional Secretary-Treasurer to carry on in the meantime.
