Thirteen Hits by Acton As Two Georgetown Hurriers Are Used

Things might have been swell in Glocca Morra last night, but the tempo in Georgetown had changed from bad to worse after Acton's Intermediate nine pummeled all the pulp out of the crazy Papertown entry by the prodigious count of 16-6. A vacation riddled squad plus an away game handicapped but couldn't halt the terrific efforts of the triple A club who belted away at the Credit Valley moundmen for something like two hours and emerged with sixteen runs after they had accumulated 13 safeties.

The first hurler on the rubber for the home club was a southpaw—Robinson by name—from the town of Brampton, at least we're so informed. He was delivering fine, in fact Georgetown were leading by 4-1 when the top half of the fourth rolled around. Clouting singles became the vogue of the Acton club around then and the bifaceted gent was deluged with four runs. All this time Pete Chabun was holding the opposition hitless with a ball they had never seen the like of in "Hogtown." Only once did Chabun slip, this was in the second frame, when Georgetown garnered four runs off six hits.

McCallum didn't slip, he just didn't have the support a sinner is accustomed to. What drives were placed in the esger claws of his backfield were fumbled so enthusiastically he must have thought this was all part of the game. Not only that, for to see the so-called fans and followers of the Papertown nine hastily leave the park, he must have figured the game was over, anyway as far as Georgetown was concerned.

Well Acton just kept on running the circuit until they had amassed sixteen runs and then because of the threatening night shade decided to call it quits at that. Now and again during the game the Georgetown team tallied a hit and they scored a couple of runs somewhere along the way.

The game was slow and after the disastrous fourth the fans found other items than baseball to discuss with their neighbors. Base umpiring was both good and enthusiastic, and in our opinion the best the Ints. have met yet.

the supplemental roll on several properties in accord with the ruling of the Court of Revision.

It was found that according to the Wartime Housing plan an additional 66 feet of Mr. N. J. Duckett's property was required for a street. At the request of Council Mr. Duckett came to Council. He said he was willing to sell additional land that might be required for the project. He had given the engineers the understanding that additional land could be secured. Mr. Duckett was willing to sell the land at the same rate as land formerly purchased. He gave a letter to this effect.

A motion was passed to annex this property into the corporation.

A letter from the Hydro-Electric Power Commission agreed to the sale of a seven foot strip adjoining the Baxter Laboratories, provided certain stipulations were carried on in the construction of any building.

Second and third readings were given the by-law authorizing the leasing of \$5,000 debentures for the addition of the Public School. The rate was set at two per cent. on this issue for five years.

The Treasurer gave a report of the current town finances and the amount in the Provincial sinking fund.

A letter from Rev. A. W. Fosbury tendered his resignation as a member of the Library Board and expressed his pleasure at having had the privilege of serving and wished Acton continued progress. Rev. L. Pickering was appointed to the vacancy.

A letter from the School Board gave a copy of the approval from the department for the erection of a temporary classroom.

A letter from the Liquor Control Board gave notice of the approval of the agreement regarding disposition of fines with the Corporation of Acton.

A resolution was passed naming, Monday, August 4th as Civic Holiday for Acton.

A letter from the Department of Planning and development asked for information regarding Acton industries to be supplied each month.

Accounts for indigent patients were received and approved.
