PARCELS SENT TO ENGLAND ARE APPRECIATED

Some time ago the Woman's Association of the United Church sent food parcels to England and as an indication of the welcome they received, Miss E. Hawthorne, secretary of the Association, received a letter which expressed the deep gratitude of one of the recipients.

Mrs. Grace Fuller of Cliftonville, Gargate, Kent, began her letter by saying, "The parcel arrived in excellent condition and it was a true God-send as all my points were used up and you know, most of our tinned goods are on points and we mostly have to eke out our small meat rations with at least one tinned meat dinner a week."

The English housewife states that she was hardly able to believe her eyes when she saw a whole pound of lovely pure lard. In England the rations are one ounce per person each week of cooking fat which is a "horrible dirty greyish-white color," and which is composed of vegetable fats.

Dried fruits, says Mrs. Fuller, range from 12 to 16 points per pound. Since she has no small children of her own, she passed on the fruit juice contained in the parcel to a friend who did have children.

In speaking of some of the other contents of the box, Mrs. Fuller goes on to say, "I am going to use the biscuit mixture for a tea time treat on Sunday. It does my heart good to know that in other parts of the world, people are so thoughtful and kind."

"Perhaps Mrs. Fuller expresses the philosophy of many of the English people when at the close of her letter she writes, 'I do hope we shall soon see better times, but after such a terrible war, things cannot be straight in a few months.'"
