

Mrs. Grace Fuller of Cliftonville, received from the many friends in Gargate, Kent, began her letter by saying, "The parcel arrived in excellent condition and it-was a true Godsend as all my points were used up and you know most of our tinned goods are on points and we mostly have to eke out our small meat rations with at least one tinned meat

The English housewife states that she was hardly able to believe her eyes when she saw a whole pound of lovely pure lard. In Egland the ratlons are one ounce per person each week of cooking fat which is a "horrible dirty greyish-white color," and which is composed of vegetable fats. Dried fruits, says Mrs. Fuller, range from 12 to 16 points per pound.
