SPICED GOOSEBERRIES 2% qts. of berries, 1 cup of vinegar, 2 lbs. sugar, 1 tbsp. cinnamon, ¼ tsp. allspice, ¼ tsp. cloves. Cut off the tails and stems of simmer slowly for about 20 minutes. Bottle in small, airtight jars.

PEAR CHOW CHOW 8 pears, 3 onlbns, 3 sweet red peppers, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 cups vinegar, 4 cup water, 2-taps. salt, 2 taps, whole spice.

Peel ontons, remove seeds from peppers, put both through food chopper, using coarse knife. Peel and core pears. Cut-in-small-cubes.-Mix sugar, spices, salt and vinegar. Heat to boiling point. 8 lbs. ripe peaches, whole cloves 4 cup water, 2 cups cider vinegar 214 cups sugar, 3 thsps. stick cinnamon, 1 tsp. root ginger, 2 tbsps. of mixed pickling spice, 4\lemon. thinly sliced. *


