According to C. L. S. Palmer, the President of the Halton Crop Improvement Association an evening meeting is being held by the Association on the farm of George Currie & Sons, lot 6, of the 7th line, Equestrian Township, just two miles above Hornby, on Monday, August 11 at 7:30 p.m.

On this farm the local Crop Improvement Association in co-operation with the Field Husbandry Department of the O. A. C. laid down replicated variety tests with some 38 varieties of oats and barley. Professor James Laughland of Guelph will lead in the discussion on these varieties and other crop problems. It is also anticipated that Kenneth McNight of the Crops, Seeds and Weeds Branch, Toronto, will be on hand to discuss chemical weed killers and long term pastures. We also understand that R. S. Heathcington, National Film Board operator will screen one or two educational films.

Wallet With \$1200 Caused Concern In County Police Court

An old black wallet containing nearly \$1200 caused much concern among officials and principals in Magistrate Langdon's Court last week until final ruling was made placing the large amount of money in custody of police officers.

Neither the court, Crown or police seemed to share their responsibility but were willing to abide by a ruling of the court in connection with placing the amount of cash found in the wallet in safe keeping. Earlier during the preliminary hearing of John Krywiaruchuk, the black wallet containing \$1,191 cash in various denominations, was entered into the proceedings as an exhibit by Crown Attorney W. I. Dick. At conclusion of the trial, the Court was interested in placing the exhibit in safe keeping until accused appeared before a higher court for his trial.

"What disposition will be made of the money," the Court asked. "I think it should remain in the hands of the Crown. That is the usual practice," Mr. Sullivan, defense counsel advised. "It's a lot of money; it's an awful temptation," Crown Attorney Dick observed. "Yes, the races start in Hamilton next Saturday," Mr. Sullivan interjected smilingly. "Eh?" Mr. Dick asked. "He says the races start in Hamilton next Saturday," Magistrate Langdon repeated in a louder voice. "Then the evidence remains in the hands of the Crown?" Mr. Sullivan asked. "Mr. Dick left the court after a clerk brought in a large brown envelope and returned with sealing wax and matches. After the wallet, money and other envelopes had been placed in the sealed envelope, the Court asked "Will the contents be delivered to the Inspector? Have you any objections, Mr. Wood?"

"I would much sooner have it turned over to the bank manager for safe keeping," Inspector Woods replied. "But there might be another bank robbery," said Mr. Dick amid smiles. "Possibly it would be safer with the Inspector," the Court ruled asking an officer to adjourn the sittings.

the numbers recorded as similar to those taken by the armed trio. He told defense counsel he kept no record of the \$10 bills, but only the new bills which were kept in the safe as surplus cash amounting to \$2,300. Describing to Mr. Sullivan the procedure of having a shipment of cash arrive at his office, he said the bills in question had been received on May 22 and the numbers recorded by him on June 13, adding the bills had not been touched while in the safe since that date. However, he added, a customer had asked for a brand new five dollar bill and he had removed one from the top of the bundle, inserting an old bill and recording the number of it. Witness said it would not be possible for anyone to remove the bills from the safe without his knowledge.

Inspector Wood, the second witness, described in detail the arrest of Krywiaruchuk at the Pine Top Tourist Camp on Highway 20 on the morning of July 12. He said he found the accused and a woman identified as Elsie Nash in Cabin Number 5. Searching the bed a black wallet filled so full of money it could not be closed was located under the pillow. Krywiaruchuk refused to answer when the inspector asked if the money belonged to him, while the woman told the officer it did not belong to her. "There were some old bills and a bundle of new fives and a bundle of new two dollar bills in the wallet. The numbers of the new bills corresponded to those stolen from the Bank of Nova Scotia July 8," Inspector Woods told the court.

Questioned by Mr. Dick in respect to his procedure of conduct in connection with the line-up, Inspector Woods stated 16 men were used. "Some of them were inmates of the jail while others were residents picked up from the streets of Milton. We chose a reasonable number of men the approximate age and stature of the suspect. They were lined up in a jail corridor with the sheriff and one of the line. I was sitting at a table. A witness came in alone and was ushered to a locked room so he could not contact other witnesses," Inspector Woods explained. "Det. Albert Chennery corroborated the former witness' evidence, "up to the point of the line-up. I wasn't in on that," he stated.

When asked by the court if he had anything to say in his own behalf, Krywiaruchuk in a gruff voice replied "not a thing". Mr. Sullivan argued the bank manager had said he identified two others in the line-up and they did not appear in court. He thought they should also be there, as all they had on his mind was the fact that they found him with some stolen money in his possession. The court ruled it was interested in the evidence before it, and as no evidence had been produced in connection with the other men, he was committing accused for trial.
