# MANY YOUNG PHEASANTS HAVE BEEN RELEASED IN HALTON



In co-operation with the Department of Lands and Forests, Halton Sportsman's Association, along with Game Warden Dudley Hitchcox, of Oakville placed 1,120 ten week old pheasant hens and cock birds in temporary shelters throughout Halton County last week. All birds were banded by the Department, and sportsmen who bag birds at the next shoot will know whether the birds were raised under natural surroundings or whether they were birds released this year. The photo, at upper left shows Wilfred Crozier, treasurer of the Halton Sportsman's Association and Game Warden Hitchcox standing beside a temporary pen. It is planned that if a greater percentage of birds reach the adult stage

this year, permanent pens will be constructed. One of the temporary pens is situated on Mr. Robertson's farm. **Wallace Ave. to Get Power Line When Road Grading Done**

Wartime Housing to get Permanent Line—3 Transformers are Promised for November

The regular meeting of Acton Public Utilities Commission was held on Tuesday evening. Chairman C. M. Hansen presided and Reeve F. J. McCutcheon and Commissioner J. R. MacArthur were present.

A card of thanks was presented from the family of Reeve McCutcheon for the flowers sent during his recent bereavement and Reeve McCutcheon also voiced his personal thanks.

Superintendent Wilson reported that he was ready to instal the power line into Wartime Housing, as soon as the road grading was completed on Wallace Ave. It was felt that the expense of running a temporary line into the subdivision did not justify the service that could be given for the short time until the road is completed.

Superintendent Wilson was granted permission to take a few days off next week to attend the meeting of the Georgian Bay Metermen's Association being held in Muskoka.

The order for three transformers was confirmed with the Packard Electric Co., Guelph, and they will be installed as soon as they arrive.

The prices on underground cable and boxes as asked for by the Council had not as yet been received, but as soon as the data can be compiled the information will be passed on to the Council.

Miss Walker has been called to Winnipeg and during her absence it was decided to hire Miss Waller to assist with the billing, etc.

Mr. John McGeachie, secretary-treasurer was granted an increase in salary at the rate of \$100 per annum for the balance of 1947.

As requested by Council the Commission are bonding Mr. McGeachie for handling the town monies. This is necessitated as the Council do not pay him any salary direct, but pay through the Commission.

Notices are being displayed at the Bank of Montreal announcing a change in banking hours on Saturday mornings, and customers are requested to do their business from 9 to 11 o'clock instead of from 9.30 to noon, as formerly. The change becomes effective this Saturday.

Briefly, the idea behind the change is to give the bank's staff a better break on their week-end time. The old idea that bankers worked from only 10 to 3 to the envy of most people has long been exploded. This was never true, for much remains to do after his doors are closed.

With the great burden of work on banking personnel, which developed during the war and which has carried into the peace, it has been necessary for bank staffs to work much overtime for a number of years. It is frequently the case on Saturdays, with the traditional closing at noon, for the staff to be obliged to work on until anywhere from 1 to 3 p.m., which, to say the least, goes hard on plans for a Saturday afternoon outing or a week-end's fishing.
