FORMER ACTON BOY NOW STUDIES SINGING ON SCHOLARSHIPS

Roy Wildgust, whose father, Roy Wildgust Sr., was for a number of years choir leader in the Acton Presbyterian Church, has returned to his home in London, Ont. for a six week rest from voice training and singing at the Academy of Vocal Art in Philadelphia. He is going back in September to take his third successive scholarship granted him by the school.

The singer, who was born in Acton 28 years ago, came out of the navy with a desire to entertain. He interested a New York impresario in his lyric burlesque voice and through him obtained a scholarship at the Philadelphia School. Department of Veterans Affairs arranged to support him through use of rehabilitation credits.

Having completed two years' training, Mr. Wildgust spent the late spring and early summer singing with Metropolitan Opera soloists at Philadelphia and New York.

Before the war, Mr. Wildgust sang in London churches and at concerts.
