BACK FROM STUDY OF MOSQUITOES, ETC. AT CHURCHILL, MAN.

Anyone going into Canada's north country in the early summer has found the onslaughts of black flies and mosquitoes almost intolerable. For the permanent residents of these northern districts there is little escape from the pests. With the object of making a study of these biting insects and developing an experimental control program a joint Canadian-United States party of experts recently visited Churchill, Man., arriving there in May, 1947.

Black flies breed in great numbers in streams and rivers in the Churchill region, and the species most annoying to humans was on the wing by the first week of July. From that time on the black flies became increasingly troublesome and persons not adequately protected were severely bitten. Local residents reported that the insects persist, but in diminishing numbers, until the snow flies.

September Session School Board Held on Tuesday

Enrollment at Public School Heavy In Spite of Additional Room

Acton School Board met in September session, Tuesday evening, the opening day of school, when Trustees Dr. E. G. Drake, T. Jones, A. Kirkness, L. Elliot and G. A. Dills were present and Chairman J. Chapman presided.
Principal McKenzie reported on the opening of the school. The building operations were not complete for opening day but as soon as window frames arrived the job would be completed. There were 60 children for kindergarten where there was only room for 50 pupils. The Board issued instructions to meet this situation and some of the older pupils would have to start in Grade I and possibly some of the town pupils would have to be refused admission.
A list of test books required for the Public School was submitted and the Board agreed to purchase them. The enrollment on the first day was 380 pupils.
Principal Stewart submitted a requisition for art supplies and this was approved. A further list of supplies required and was to be submitted.

The attendance was lower than last year. There was a total of 91 on the first day but more would likely be attending bringing the enrollment to 100. The upper school was larger but lower forms were down in enrollment.
The secretary reported on funds available for the High School and showed that with lower grants a deficit was likely even if all expenditures were trimmed drastically. The budget drawn in January had been made on usual provincial grants. Consideration was asked for introducing music into the High School. The Board agreed to give the matter consideration.

A report was submitted on the change in fuel grants and training and no decision was made until definite instructions were received regarding grant and regulations.
The Upper School results were reviewed and in the first year were considered very satisfactory. Of the five candidates one student had taken all nine units and one student had been successful in eight of the nine subjects. The Acton school was well up in comparison with other schools from which reports had been received.

PURE PEPPER AVAILABLE BUT PRICES HIGH

Paul Sykes, Canadian trade commissioner in Singapore, reports that there is no basis for the apprehension regarding world supplies of pepper and the possible necessity for the continued use of wartime substitutes. There are ample supplies of various types of pepper available for immediate export from Singapore, and prospective Canadian buyers can be supplied with firm orders at any time, though prices are comparatively high. Despite reported shortages and keen demand in Canada and the United States, no business worth mentioning is being done in either of these markets at present.
