Seek Improvements In Town's Street Lighting

School Gets New Pipes — Transformers Ready for Wallace Ave.—Mill Wants Service

The regular meeting of Acton Public Utilities Commission was held on Tuesday evening. Chairman C. M. Hansen presided with Reeve F. J. McCutcheon and J. R. MacArthur present.

Superintendent Wilson reported that the transformers had arrived and would be installed as soon as the grading was completed on Wallace Ave., so that the line could be built.

The concession committee of the Fall Fair had laid out the anticipated load for the Fall Fair and gave an estimate to Mr. Wilson of how much power would be used so the line at the park could be prepared.

Mr. D. H. Lindsay was present at the meeting requesting water service to his mill on Mill Street. The Commission felt this service would have to be installed from Victoria Avenue to save crossing the creek in front of the mill property with the water line. The Commission promised to get an estimate of the cost of installing this service and lay the matter before Council for their decision as it would be a big outlay for installing one service.

Superintendent Lambert was instructed to get the town employees to use their truck for back filling a water service on Scene Street, and for removing the stone that had been blasted from the trench.

Superintendent Wilson was instructed to install two street lights on Peel and Arthur streets as requested by Council.

A number of suggestions were made for improving the street lighting in parts of the town which are being built up. Reeve McCutcheon will take up this matter with Council before any lights are installed. The lights in question are on Queen Street east, Guelph Street and Main Street where No. 7 Highway enters the town.

Superintendent Lambert reported a leak had developed at the school property. As fixing this leak will necessitate shutting off the water for both schools, help will be procured in laying new pipe, and cast iron pipe on hand will be installed as it is felt that a patching job would not be satisfactory. This job is to be done as soon as the necessary material is procurable.

Federation of Agric. Begins Work on Community Centre

The Directorate of Halton County Federation of Agriculture for some years has recognized the need for a rural recreation spot in Halton County, which would be owned and controlled by the farmers themselves. Three years ago when it was suggested a field day and picnic be held, the question arose as to where such an event could be held in Halton County. The answer seemed to be to have it in some other county or some private grounds. This, of course, was not satisfactory and the field day was dropped for that year. However, the next year when the question came up again, it was agreed to hold the field day on the Fair grounds in Milton, the only site in Halton owned by the farmers of the county. However, when it came to holding a field day and picnic, the Fair grounds did not prove entirely satisfactory since both shade and water were lacking.

The directors of the Federation, recognizing the need for some spot in the country, made a survey of the county. It was agreed that the Twelve Mile Creek at Lovellville on the Wm Featherstone farm offered the greatest possibilities for the development of a recreational centre and picnic ground. Since the Featherstone farm at that time was being offered for sale, it was proposed that the Halton County Federation of Agriculture purchase it and sponsor its development.

It would be a place where farm families, family unions, Women's Institutes, Junior Farmers, Farm Forums, Sunday Schools and church groups could conveniently hold their annual picnics and other recreational events.

This purchase was made possible by three public spirited men of Halton who put up the entire purchase price for the one hundred acres, sixty-five of which have since been resold.

A committee was appointed at the last directors meeting consisting of five representatives from each township. This committee met on the property last Friday evening to plan the work on the development of the land. It was agreed that on Monday, Sept. 15th a bee should be held which will be open to all who are interested. Members of this committee report that six or seven tractors and at least fifty men with chains, saws, axes and shovels, will be on hand to help.
