CAUSE HEAVY DAMAGE

A total of 3,348 farm fires in Canada in 1946 caused a property loss valued at \$4,200,141, according to returns compiled by W. In Clairmont Dominion Fire Commissioner.

Ontario had the most farm fires 1,604, which destroyed property men 32,455,925. Quelsed was not with 700 form fires and a property loss of \$721,655. Then came Saskatchewan with 278 fires, with a toss of \$211,223; Manitoha, - 241--fires, - loss \$149,654; Alberta, 129 fires, loss \$149,-220; Nova Scotia, 85 fires loss \$100,-675; Prince Edward Island, 81 fires, loss \$83,668; British Columbia, 57 fires, loss \$213,612.
