Rural Accidents Increasing

The worst months for traffic are coming up, warns Ontario's Highway Minister, the Hon. George H. Doolittle. Even now, the traffic toll is spiralling upward at an alarming rate. The seasonal upswing in accidents, according to the department figures, starts toward the end of May. For the past ten years, the month of June has shown an average of 146 more persons killed and 278 more injured than in the preceding May. But comparative figures for June 1937 and June 1946 showed some indication that the accident toll was under better control ten years ago in June. 75 persons were killed and 1,123 injured in Ontario's traffic accidents while last June, 57 people were killed and 1,124 injured.

The increase in rural accidents according to Mr. Doolittle is much greater than those occurring in urban centres. Highway Department figures for the first quarter of 1947 show that there was a 41.6% increase in motor accidents in the rural areas as compared to a 20.9% increase in the urban area. Property damage resulting from motor accidents shows a 61.1% increase in rural centres and a 49.6% increase in the urban centres. Mr. Doolittle stresses the need for motorists and non-motorists to observe every precaution on our urban and rural roadways. "There is no substitute," he states, "for care, courtesy and common sense on the part of our drivers and pedestrians."

Very drastic penalties will be meted out to owners and drivers of motor vehicles who do not abide by the measures imposed by the recent amendments to the Highway Act. The new laws go into effect on July 1st and thereafter automatic suspension of driving privileges will follow conviction where an accident occurs arising out of such offenses as: failing to stop at a through street; failing to heed a traffic signal; failing to signal properly when turning; driving without prescribed lights; operating with defective brakes; overcrowding the driver's seat; and numerous other offences usually classed as minor.

"The accident news appearing in the press and on the radio should remind us all that it is up to each of us to do his or her part in halting the terrible loss of human life and suffering due to traffic accidents."

TRAINING FOR MANAGEMENT IN BRITAIN

The importance of training young men and women for managerial posts in industry and commerce has long been recognized in Britain. Publication of a plan for the complete reorganization of training arrangements for part-time students is therefore an event of special importance. This plan is the Report of the Crivick Committee on Education for Management which was appointed in 1945 to examine facilities for education for management in industry and commerce and to suggest means of coordinating the requirements of various professional organizations. The courses already provided in Technical and Commercial Colleges are proving of immense value and the demand for them increases rapidly. The report nevertheless stresses the fact that practical experience with the right qualities of character are essential and that such theoretical training alone is not enough.

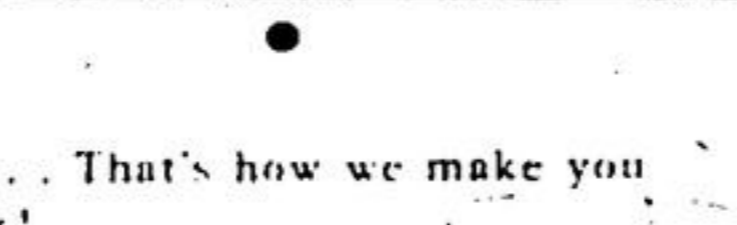
