MHS. BENJAMIN PETCH

Injuries from a fall which she suffered in April proved fatal for Mrs. Benjamin Petch, who passed away in Hamilton on Tuesday, September 2nd. Formerly Marjorie Louise McKane and was born eighty years ago at Linwood in Waterloo County, a daughter of the late James McKane and Marjorie Heggs. Fifty-one years ago, she married her late husband, a well-known farmer and auctioneer in Chinguacousy who predeceased her in 1929. She had made her home in Georgetown for the past several years, sharing an apartment with her sister, Mrs. H. G. Clark, until her accident last spring.

Mrs. Petch attended Union Presbyterian church during her residence in that district and had attended Knox church since she moved to Georgetown. She is survived by an only son, Frank of Georgetown, who has followed his father's trade as auctioneer, and one grandson, Ross. Surviving are three sisters and one brother, Mrs. H. G. Clark, (Anne) of Parita, Mrs. R. C. Gibson (Emily) of Hamilton, Mrs. S. Fraser (Ada) of Manitoba and James A. McKane of St. Catharines.

JOHN CLAYTON BRADLEY

Surrounding an illness contracted while he was serving with the army overseas, John Clayton Bradley passed away suddenly on Friday, September 25th, while being taken to Toronto by ambulance. The popular local merchant had been taking treatment at Christie Street Hospital for the past year for leukemia and had been home for two weeks until the latest attack which proved fatal.

Born in Georgetown 31 years ago, he was the youngest son of Mrs. Harvey Bradley and the late Mr. Bradley. He attended public and high school and played on the junior hockey team as a boy. Formerly employed at the Provincial Paper Mills, he was associated with his brother Roy in operating Bradley Brothers' Store. In June 1942, he enlisted for army service and after training at Brampton and Camp Borden went overseas with the RCASC. He landed in France soon after "D" Day and served through the campaign in France, Belgium, Holland and Germany.

In February, 1946, shortly after his return to Canada, he married Mary Young of Acton and this spring they moved to No. 4 Normandy Boulevard with their 6 month old daughter, Beverly Ann. Surviving besides his wife and daughter are his mother, who makes her home in Oshawa, two sisters and three brothers. Mrs. Eileen Parkinson and Mrs. Edwin Hoare (Hazel) of Oshawa, Clifford of Acton and Wilbert and Roy of Georgetown. Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson conducted the funeral service in St. George's Church on Monday with the choir assisting. Friends thronged the church to pay their last respects, many from out-of-town points including Oshawa, Barrie, Toronto, Stratford, Burlington, Elora, Acton, Mount Forest, Oakville and Inglewood. 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
