stated, adding he thought the board would grant the request.

Members also approved of a resolution received from Wentworth County asking the Provincial Government to increase the rate from \$1.50 a day to \$2.50 for indigent patients in hospitals for incurables so that the amount of fifty cents a day by municipalities will be sufficient to satisfy the hospitals to cover increased operating costs.

Council gave its approval to a by-law sponsored by Trafalgar Township who are seeking to close West Street in Bronte. Reeve Bilgar explained it was a matter of the lake closing it unless a breakwater was erected. He said the road of 150 feet was used very little.

The warden informed members the annual meeting of county representatives would be held at the county home sometime in November.

Approval was given a recommendation of Reeve Whitaker that a covered outside entrance be placed at the rear of the Health Unit residence.

Council were in receipt of a notice that the Ontario Municipal Board would hold a meeting in Acton on September 30 to hear all parties concerned with the annexation of the new sub-division from Easington.

Council adjourned to meet October 14.

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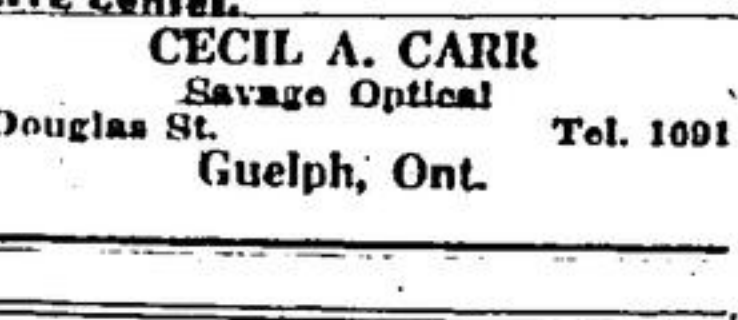
