## Georgetown Man Killed When Struck by Car Saturday

Sammy Homewood, 19, a farm boy from the outskirts of Georgetown was fatally injured when struck by a car while walking on Highway 7 west of Georgetown Saturday night. He died in Peel Memorial Hospital at Brampton early Sunday morning.

## County Program for Citizenship Group to be Planned

On April 21st of this year, a large group of Halton rural young people came before our County Court Judge His Honor W. N. Munro, and during a very impressive ceremony, they were each presented with a Certificate of Canadian Citizenship. At this time, they were publicly recognized as Citizens of Canada, although they had previously assumed this status automatically upon reaching their twenty-first birthday. The ceremony impressed upon them the important duties, privileges and responsibilities which they had acquired when they, as Canadian-born young people, became citizens of a free democratic country.

The ceremony was the climax of a series of meetings held in three well distributed places in the county, and sponsored by the Halton Junior Farmers' Association.

Because this educational project was such an unqualified success, the directorate of the Junior Farmers' Association of Ontario, (an organization comprising more than 8,000 members) had the program placed before the annual conference of this organization with the idea that the project be expanded to other countries across the province.

To discuss the possibilities of a county-wide program for the benefit of both rural and town young people the Citizenship Committee of the Halton Junior Farmers' Association met with a very small group, representative of some other organized bodies in the County.

The group consulted were unanimous in the opinion that such a project would receive the active support and cooperation of most of the organizations in the County, and as a result of this, the Halton Junior Farmers' Association has called a meeting to be held in the Milton High School, the evening of Thursday, October 30th at 8:30 p.m.

There is no doubt that such a project will receive much co-operation from the Community Program Division of the Ontario Dept. of Education. Mr. Norman C. Lindsay, Supervisor of this Branch will be on hand to address the meeting, and to

## NOTICE - Re Traffic Regulations in Acton

Extracts from Traffic By-law No. 587 at July 20th, 1928 are published for information and guidance of all persons.

SECTION (8) "No vehicle shall be allowed to remain upon or be driven through any street so as to blockade or obstruct traffic."

SECTION (11) "Vehicles shall not stop on or obstruct crossings."

SECTION (12) "No vehicle shall stop so as to obstruct the entrance to any lane or driveway into private garages or into any building."

The occupant of any business or property on any street shall be given space for parking on such street if such space is required by him, subject to the regular traffic regulations."

SECTION (13) "No horse or vehicle shall be left in such a manner as to obstruct the ordinary traffic of the streets, and no horse or vehicle shall be parked an unreasonable length of time, having regard to the traffic requirements of the street in question."

SECTION (14) "No vehicle shall stand within six feet of a fire hydrant."

SECTION (15) "No vehicle shall stand or park directly opposite another vehicle which is already standing on the other side of the street when such standing or parking will prevent the passage of two lines of traffic."

The foregoing extracts apply in all parts of the village and especially to an Agnes Street, a very narrow street between Frederick and Elgin Streets.
