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STATEMENT FROM REEVE McCUTCHEON RE MASS X-RAY SURVEY

One of the functions of your town Ontario Title government is to make Acton as attractive as possible with a view to encouraging new business concerns to establish themselves here and to keep our present entemprises satisfied.

A healthy community is a prime requisite if we are to be successful in our efforts and we must take stops to prevent such a disease as tuberculous from endangering the health of our population. This is a Unbility which Acton seriously intends to put out of

Tuberculosis is no respector of persons. There is a very definite danger of infection to our residents if active cases are allowed to go undetected. 80 per cent, of those having tuberculesis in the early stages are not conscious of being ill and consequently see no reason to consult a physician until the disease has considerably advanced. The only certain way such cases can be discovered is by means of an x-ray of the lungs.

Facilities are now available whereby all residents of a community may be x-rayed rapidly and with a minimum of effort. Such a program will be offered here beginning October 24. It is being sponsored by the Y's Men's Club in co-operation with the Ontario Tuberculosis Association and Ontario Deparament of Health and paid for by funds from the sale of Christmas Seals in this area. Everyone of High School Age and over will receive a free chest x-ray.

I carneally request that every citizen respond most wholeheartedly to this campaign, first by having an xray and then by supporting the project among their friends and acqualatances by word or mouth. By so doing you will not only protect yourself and your family, but make Acton : healther place in which to live.
