STATEMENT FROM REEVE McCUTCHEON RE MASS X-RAY SURVEY

One of the functions of your town government is to make Acton as attractive as possible with a view to encouraging new business concerns to establish themselves here and to keep our present enterprises satisfied.

A healthy community is a prime requisite if we are to be successful in our efforts and we must take steps to prevent such a disease as tuberculosis from endangering the health of our population. This is a liability which Acton seriously intends to put out of business.

Tuberculosis is no respecter of persons. There is a very definite danger of infection to our residents if active cases are allowed to go undetected. 80 per cent. of those having tuberculosis in the early stages are not conscious of being ill and consequently see no reason to consult a physician until the disease has considerably advanced. The only certain way such cases can be discovered is by means of an x-ray of the lungs.

Facilities are now available whereby all residents of a community may be x-rayed rapidly and with a minimum of effort. Such a program will be offered here beginning October 24. It is being sponsored by the Y's Men's Club in co-operation with the Ontario Tuberculosis Association and Ontario Department of Health and paid for by funds from the sale of Christmas Seals in this area. Everyone of High School Age and over will receive a free chest x-ray.

I earnestly request that every citizen respond most wholeheartedly to this campaign, first by having an x-ray and then by supporting the project among their friends and acquaintances by word or mouth. By so doing you will not only protect yourself and your family, but make Acton a healthier place in which to live.

Defeat Delhi Two Straight and Win Ontario Title

Tobacco-makers ran up three runs. "Dude" Ljunday started the merry-go-round whirling in the top half of the first when it appeared it was going to be a runaway. His ringing triple with Masters on the sacks from a single, sparked Masales, Kentner, Footitt, the two Waterhouse's Jack and Bill and Don Ryder to placing Gifford, the Delhi mountdaman's offerings wherever they willed.

In the bottom half of the initial, Johnson, Van Goethen and Bowyer crossed the plate on four hits, a pass and Hicks' crossing into a pitched ball's path.

Acton added another run in the top half of the third as Bill Waterhouse singled for the second time, made second and went home with Don Ryder's long drive into the outfield. Another run in the sixth and they had rung up nine runs.

From here in, the triple A club played defensive baseball. In spite of this Delhi counted two runs in the half of the sixth. Zeke Van Goethen, 3rd-baseman, smashed out a double which carried in Johnson, later scoring himself as Axford slammed the gate into left field. Another run was averted when Owen Masales, attempting to catch Axford at third, failed and heaved to first catching Bowyer off guard and retiring the side. Bill Waterhouse made the put out in a lovely play which brought him in from right field.

The ninth inning was breathtaking. Sayeau made the bases as he was hit by a pitched ball. Burns singled and Sayeau slid to third. Hicks struck out but Bertling rifled to safety which enabled Sayeau and Burns to find the plate. Gifford was given the opportunity of winning his own ball game but a ground ball to Masales retired the side and won the championship.

Fifteen hits were knocked from Ryder's offerings while Acton gleaned the same number from Gifford. Van Goethen paced the Tobaccomen at the plate with four bingles out of five trips. Veteran Bill Waterhouse was the brilliant star of the Acton offensive with three hits. Bob Footitt played an exceptional game in centre field.
