No Appeals At Court of Revision For Esquensing Twp.

Borrowing By-Laws Passed For Building and Alterations at Township Hall

A Court of Revision for the Township of Esquensing was held Monday afternoon at 1.30. G. E. Cleave, Geo. Currie, George Leslie, H. C. Reid and Wilfred Bird were present. Having taken the required oath, a motion was moved by Mr. Bird, seconded by Mr. Currie, that Mr. Cleave be chairman of this Court of Revision. Carried.

As there were no appeals, a motion was moved by Mr. Reid, seconded by Mr. Leslie, that the clerk be authorized to certify to the said roll for the year 1948. Carried.

The regular meeting of Council was held in Norval immediately after the Court of Revision. All members present. Reeve G. E. Cleave presided. Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. Correspondence was read and dealt with.

The following accounts were passed for payment: Ontario Hospital, Woodstock, \$38.50; G. E. Cleave, A. W. Henton and I. M. Bennett, select-judges, \$15.00; Thos. Cook, Harry Bussy and R. W. Cunningham, fence viewing, \$12.00; Ontario Agricultural College, copy of map, \$1.00; Bell Telephone Co. services, \$1.05; I. M. Bennett, registration letters, 78c; Province of Saskatchewan, charity account, \$20.00; Branch 120 Canadian Legion, Poppy Day grant, \$15.00; May Hicken, election wages, \$6.80; A. G. Thompson, stamps, etc., \$9.60; dog licenses, \$206.15; kennel licenses, \$12.50; steel tape, \$9.75; stamps, \$7.00.

The road superintendent was instructed to advertise for tenders for snow ploughing for winter of 1947-48 and the Treasurer was authorized to pay the road accounts of \$2,875.09.

A by-law was passed to borrow \$14,000 for the payment of new machinery. Another by-law was passed to borrow \$16,000 to erect a building for repair and storage of machinery and remodelling the Township Hall.

By-law No. 20-47 to authorize the borrowing of \$30,000 from the Canadian Bank of Commerce, for the purpose of enabling the Township to carry out the terms of By-laws No. 18-47 and 19-47, was given the required number of readings and passed.

Relief accounts of \$60.00 were passed and the cheque of C. G. Riddell re road contract was returned. The Municipal Board was to be paid \$16.00 for approval of a by-law.

The treasurer was authorized to pay Hawes and Nelson \$600.65 on hall account and the Bank of Commerce \$1200.00 re Hawes and Nelson account.

Council adjourned until December 15th.
