Of the Municipal Corporation of the County of Halton to Restrict and Regulate the Cutting of Trees was Passed at the Courthouse, Milton, on April 15th, 1947, and is Herewith Produced in Part as Follows:

The Council of the Corporation of

Except for dead, broken, stunted, fire-damaged, diseased or insect infested trees, Christmas trees, and other trees that should be removed to improve growing conditions (such as thinnings and improvement cuttings. no cedar tree of a diameter of less than seven inches, or twenty-two in circumference, nor any other tree of a diameter of less than fourteen inthes or forty-four inches in circum ference, measured stump ... high, ... japproximately eighteen inches above the ground), shall be cut by any person within the County of Halton except
