Winter Storage Fruits, Vegetables

With comparatively little effort and the application of a few simple principles of storage, much can be done towards the successful holding of fruits and vegetables produced in the small garden. Success or failure in storing fruits and vegetables depends principally on having sound products at the start. Cut, bruised, frosted or otherwise damaged or misformed specimens should be discarded or placed aside for immediate consumption. Care should be taken to see that the fruits and vegetables are well maturabuse as possible.

The stored products should be exwilting is noted, steps should be taken to increase the humidity either by sprinkling the floor of the storage or moistening the sand in which the root crops may be buried. If rot or any kind of breakdown or other disease is noted, no matter how slight, it is better that affected specimens be rejected or at least separated from the sound material. If left in contact with sound fruit, the healthy specimens are likely to become tainted or otherise affected. What is more, rotting vegetation develops heat, making temperatures more difficult to control.

Another important factor to keep in mind is that as soon as the fruits or been sufficiently prepared for, storage, they should immediately be reduced to storage temperatures. At higher temperatures, vegetation ages more than at lower temperatures. Thus, if cooled immediately, the storage life of the product is prolonged.

II. The True and the False, Jude' 17-21, 24-25,

In this terrible picture of corruption in the early Church we have a situation not unlike that which confronts the ranks of broken Christendom to-day. It is a picture of a Church absorbed by he world: of a Gospel perverted in doctrine and vitiated in application. The word "sancitfied" indicates what Christians are by "calling" and profession, and what they should be in their lives. But such is far from being the case. Our pews are full of men and women "in good standing" who, in secret places of their hearts and by their lives, deny Christ (v. 4); who twist and turn the creed they profess to believe to make it mean anything they wish till they rationalize out of it the fundamental truths of he, Gospel. 
