Winter Storage Fruits, Vegetables

With comparatively little effort and the application of a few simple principles of storage, much can be done towards the successful holding of fruits and vegetables produced in the small garden.

The stored products should be examined frequently during storage. If wilting is noted, steps should be taken to increase the humidity either by sprinkling the floor of the storage or moistening the sand in which the root crops may be buried.

Another important factor to keep in mind is that as soon as the fruits or vegetables are harvested and have been sufficiently prepared for storage, they should immediately be reduced to storage temperatures.

The Sunday School Lesson

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 16th

BUILDING CHRISTIAN CHARACTER

Golden Text.—As therefore ye received Christ Jesus the Lord, so walk in him rooted and builded up in him. Col. 2: 6-7.

Lesson Text.—2 Pet. 1: 5-11; Jude 17-21, 24-25. Exposition.—I. From Grace to Grace, 2 Pet. 1: 5-11.

When one is born again, the Christian life is begun. There must be growth (1 Pet. 2: 22). Grace must be added to grace and this requires not merely diligence but "all diligence."

The word "diligence" in v. 10 is a call to the most earnest consideration of the things of our faith. These are our "calling" (Rom. 8: 30). The Christian calling is the highest in the world. Yet many treat their Christian profession as though it were light and trivial.

We are always encouraged by the Spirit of God with "exceeding great and precious promises" and v. 11 assures us of an abundant entrance into "the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

II. The True and the False, Jude 17-21, 24-25. In this terrible picture of corruption in the early Church we have a situation not unlike that which confronts the ranks of broken Christendom to-day.

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laus, plausible arguments (great swelling words, v. 16), to bolster up their infidelity. They praise of "liberalism," "tolerance," "self-expression"; they pride themselves on having rid themselves of bigotry and "inhibitions"; they talk of the "universal Fatherhood of God and His boundless mercy," using this very mercy as an excuse for self-indulgence (turning the grace of God to lasciviousness, v. 19). They wear the cloak of Christianity but have not the Spirit; they invade the Church in endless quarrels and dissensions (v. 19). Jude does not mince words. "Filthy dreamers" he calls them (v. 8), plague spots of corruption, noisily spewing up filth and refuse, wandering meteors whose momentary brilliance soon fades out into the darkness of everlasting night (vs. 12, 13). But God is not mocked; the doom of these men is sure and swift—for them is reserved "the vengeance of eternal fire" (v. 7). We do well in these days of religious wordiness and half-hearted discipleship, when the broad and narrow ways converge, when principle is pliable as wax and truth "a matter of relativity"; to take these warnings to heart. How much poorer, half-hearted preaching we have in our pulpits! How much lukewarm faith in the pews! How many are trying to receive the kingdom of God and the kingdom of the devil, to lay up treasures both in heaven and on earth, to wear both the livery of hell and "white raiment" of Heaven! It cannot be done. Evil is no less evil when called good. Beware; these wolves which come in sheep's clothing. They come to kill and destroy (Matt. 7: 15).

The enemy is strong; the flesh is weak. Except for God's keeping, all our contending, building, praying, striving would be of no avail (1 Cor. 12: 7). Of ourselves we cannot keep from falling. But God is above all, to whom is all power and dominion on earth and in Heaven. He Who in Calvary ransomed us, prayed that we might be kept from evil (Jno. 17: 9, 15, 17, 20).

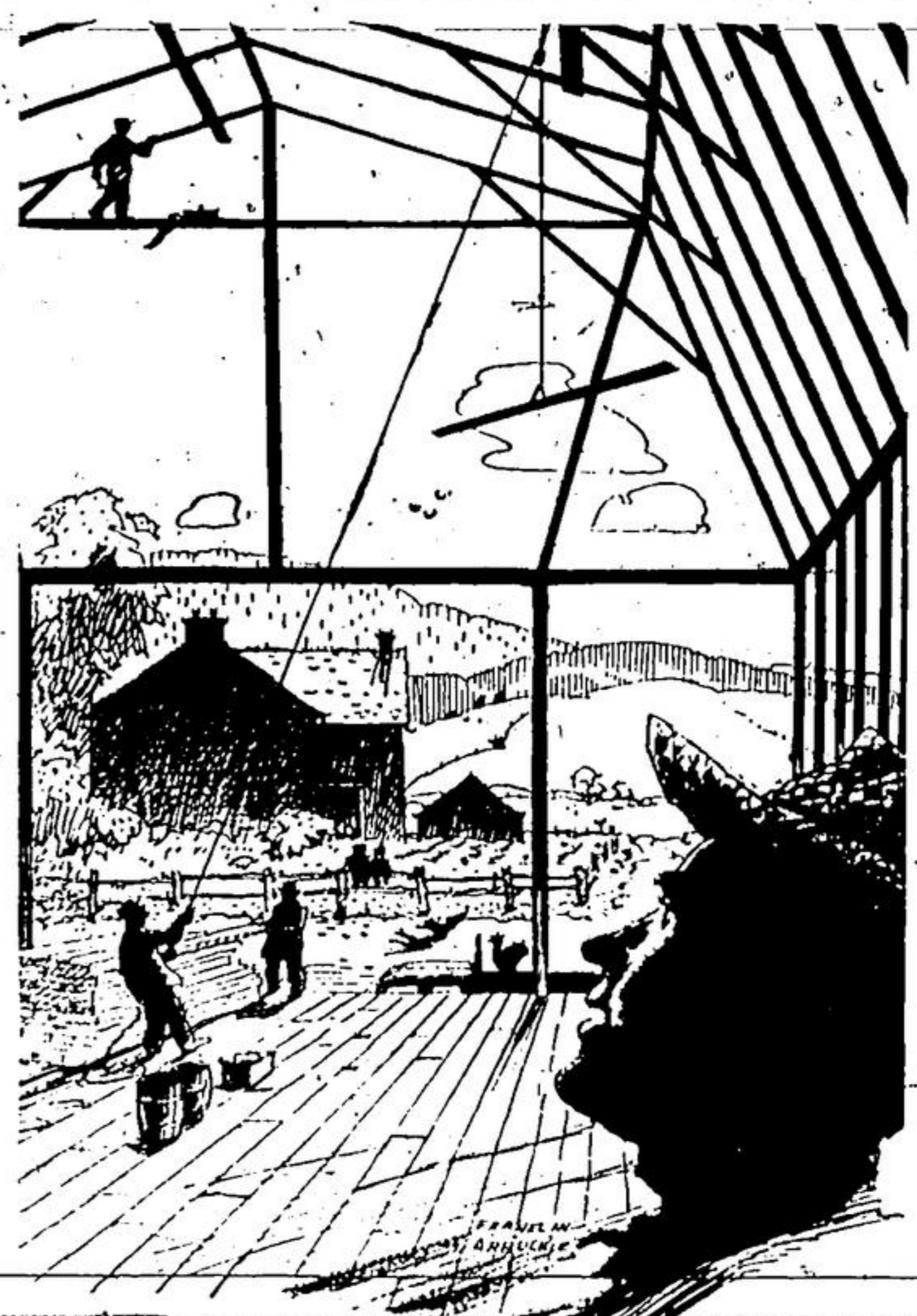

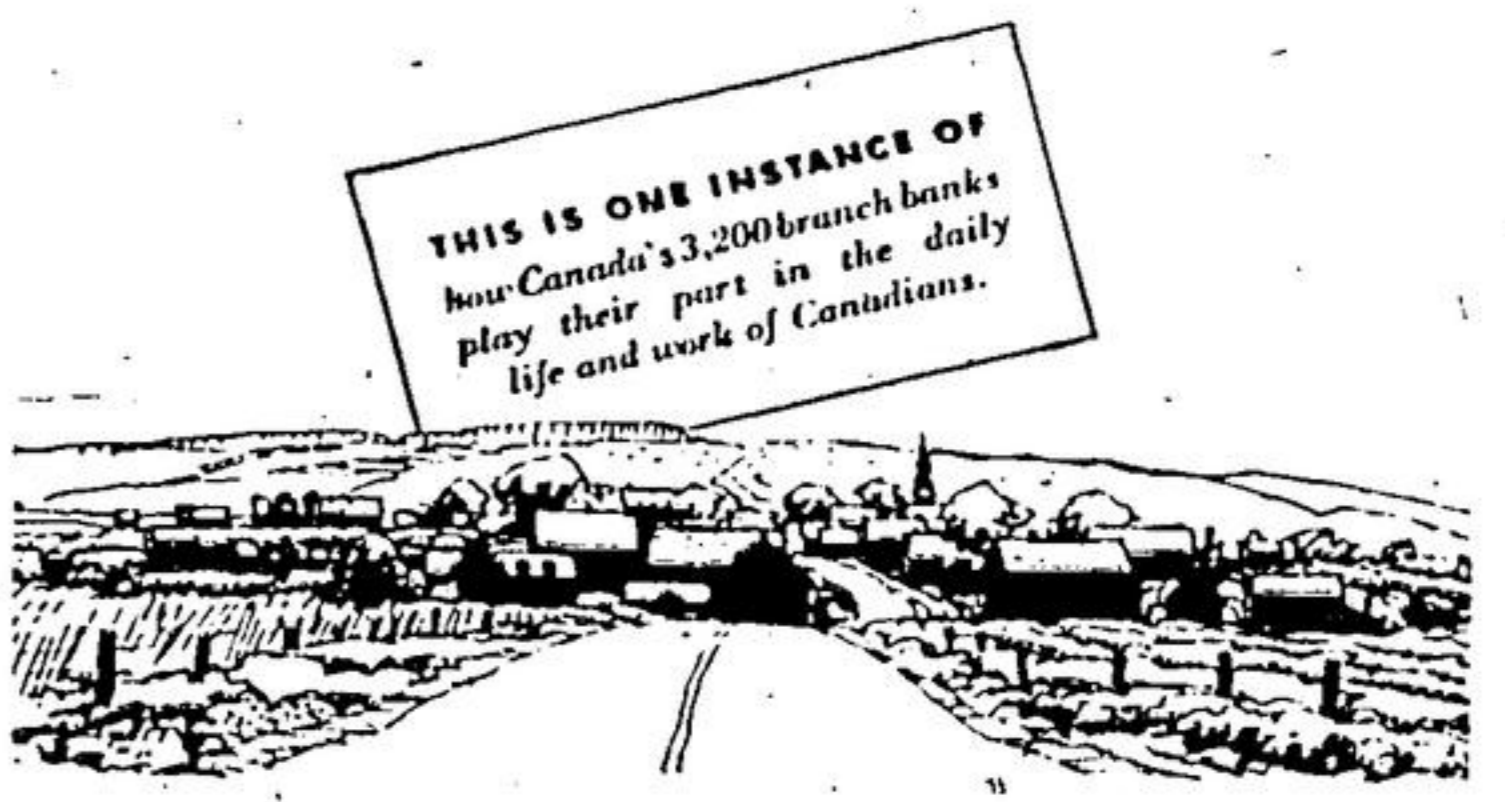


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
