DR. MARGARET GOULD

From the Hanover Post of last week we glean the following information regarding the passing of Dr. Margaret Gould, a sister of Mr. W. J. Gould of Acton.

The funeral services for the late Doctor Margaret Ann Gould of Pittsburg, Penn. were held in Hanover on Monday afternoon of this week.

Services were conducted by Rev. W. J. Mark at Richardson's Funeral Parlors, followed by interment in the family plot in Hanover Cemetery. The late Dr. Gould was born in Coleraine, Ont., a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Gould. She came to Hanover as a young child with her parents, was educated here, and taught in the public school for a few years, when she went to Toronto and entered the first class of women to be admitted to the medical faculty of Toronto University.

Graduating in 1898, Dr. Gould interned at the Women's College Hospital at Philadelphia, where she remained on the staff for two years, after which she went to Pittsburg, Penn., and practised her profession for over thirty years.

The late Dr. Gould took ill while enroute to spend the winter in Florida and passed away last Thursday at Youngstown, Pa. Hospital following a week's illness.

Surviving are one brother, William J. Gould of Acton, Ont., and one sister, Miss Agnes Gould of Pittsburg, Pa. Attending the funeral from out of town were: Miss Agnes Gould, Mr. W. J.
