If the interest and just claims of some nation or nations are neglected, such countries may develop into trouble spots and do things harmful to the world and perhaps create conditions leading to a new war.

So the world needs to work together as a team to promote the general welfare of all the nations, and to accomplish a universal spirit of good will and friendship.

A Half Century Of Prosperity

How can real wages be raised. That's a nice question, isn't it? There are some simple minded folk who feel that strikes followed by increased wage rates will do the trick and that nothing else matters. Here are the figures showing the percentage share of the total product which went to salaries and wages in 1890, in the earlier stages of our industrial development and in 1944 the peak production level of war-time demand. The table includes also the percentage of each dollar paid out for raw material and the amount left over after these payments. Out of this must come maintenance, depreciation, general overhead and profit.

Out of every dollar the producer of the raw materials received one-tenth of one per cent, less in 1944 than in 1890, the workers one per cent. more. The "all other" item which includes general overhead maintenance, depreciation, taxes, etc., declined by nine-tenths of one per cent.

What conclusions can we draw from these figures? This very simple one: The percentage which labor receives of the product produced has varied little over a long period of years. The share of others has not much changed. The improvement in conditions, the far higher standard of living now in comparison with the level of 1890 arises out of increased capacity to produce—that is the fact, those who escape from it.

In increased capacity to produce lies also the hope of the producer of raw material and of those who invest their money in industry. All share in the prosperity which comes from this source. It reaches out to every section of the community.

Now what does this mean to the factory worker? We can state the case in figures. The average worker in Canadian industry, received \$272 per year in 1890—\$1,660 per year in 1944. Why did he receive more. Because the value of production per worker employed increased in that time from \$1,274 to \$7,412. Because the worker produced more, he received more, not a larger percentage of the product produced, but almost the same percentage of a vastly increased production. To increase his percentage proportion it would be necessary to take it out of the other factors in production—that is pay less to other workers such as the producers of the raw materials.

The efforts of labor to increase the wage rate must necessarily be expressed in a higher cost of the product produced and in consequence a higher cost of living. National prosperity is not brought about by high wage rates nor by high profit rates as far as that goes. National prosperity comes from an increase in the volume of production. Can any man on earth tell us how we could improve the standard of living of all the people in Canada without an increased volume of production? We live out of and from the act of production—only by increased volume of production can we improve the standard of living. As sure as anything can be sure in this shifting world there will come a time when labor realizes this fact, then production will increase and we shall reach new standards of living soundly based, a natural result of sound thought and action.
