## C. F. Leatherland Resigns as Clerk After 40 Years

Mr. Report pointing out that Council had secured last year \$2,600 raised for school purposes.

Upon motion the application of Acton School Board for an additional \$2,400 to meet unforeseen expenditures the Reeve and Treasurer were authorized to make this payment to the Treasurer of the School Board.

Council instructed Mr. Harrop to endeavor to arrange with the Wartime Housing Contractors to secure fill and use the municipal truck to fill a low spot on the property. This would save hauling filling material in the spring.

A letter from the Cemetery Board gave a summary of the activities of the board and the finances of the Cemetery account. The Board suggested that Council make a set amount of \$500 for winter work for the caretaker. This would enable them to operate without a grant. The Board also asked that they be relieved of their duties in the near future and new members be appointed as they had served seven years.

The Clerk was asked to invite a member of the Cemetery Board and the caretaker to the next meeting so that winter employment might be arranged to meet their budget.

A letter from Clerk C. F. Leatherland asked that his resignation as clerk be accepted forthwith. He had acted in this capacity for 40 years and the work had been conducted from his office for forty years. He had enjoyed the work but the growth of Acton made the clerkship more than a part time position. He would give his successor every assistance in becoming acquainted with the work. Council expressed regret at this decision.

A letter from a number of business men requested that the Council proclaim Friday December 26th as a civic holiday. Council decided to consult the industries before making a decision on this matter.

A letter was read from the Department of Planning and Development regarding building restrictions.

The following resolution was passed: "That John McGeachie be and he hereby appointed assistant Clerk of the Village, it being understood that same is a temporary part-time position, not done during his regular working hours, and that he shall receive as compensation for his services to December 30th, 1947, the sum of sixty cents per hour for the hours worked."

A letter from the C. N. R. crossing was received regarding the guard rail at the Main Street crossing. The inspector had taken up the matter with Reeve McCutcheon and a solution was offered for widening the road and making a permanent improvement here in the spring.

Council adjourned shortly after midnight to complete the business on Thursday night. Members of the new Council were to be invited to attend the meeting to become familiar with the work.
