HEALTH LAWS

Public health authorities urge everyone to learn the basic principles of hygiene as outlined in health literature issued free on request through the provincial health departments.

Properly conducted competitive sports are essential to development of young people, according to health officers of the Department of National Health and Welfare, Ottawa. Pointing out that organized games will teach youngsters that they are members of society, the Department states that sports show players that others have rights, capacities, ambitions and feelings similar to their own. Health authorities advise parents to encourage children to play with other youngsters.
