Method of Fireproofing Your Christmas Trees

Suggestions for making Christmas trees fire-proof in order to eliminate the fire hazard during the holiday season, were advanced to-day by Fire

Chief. "As Christmas trees catch fire easilly and burn with intense heat, it is advisable that all trees used at large gatherings, such as school or church Christmas affairs should be fireproof," the chief said. "An easy method of doing this is to weigh the tree and divide the weight in pounds by 4. This will give the weight of the chemical, namely ammonium sulphate required for the operation. Place the nmonium_sulphate—in—a—narrowmouthed container such as a glass jar pail, etc., and dissolve in water, using 11 pints of water for each pound of ammonium sulphate. Just before treating the tree saw off the stem about an inch from the end, preferably at an oblique angle or in V shape . in order that the chemical solution may have free access to the fresh wood at the cut end. Set the tree the solution in a cool place, preferably 50 to 55 degrees Fah, away from direct sunlight and leave it there until most of the solution-is-absorbed, bridat dress. The great voice John Calcium chloride may be used for this purpose in the same proportion and using the same method as with ammonium sulphate. This treatment will render the Christmas tree fireresistant, and may avert a major tradgedy."
