

# OPEN; LETTER TO the Incoming 1948 Council of the Village of Acton and to Acton Citizens

I have been instructed by the Executive Committee of this Branch to strongly protest the appointment of the Village Clerk and the Village Solicitor at the meeting on December 22nd of the 1947 Village Council without these positions being open for applications.

We feel that no position under the control of the Municipality should be filled without Veterans being allowed to apply for same. Furthermore, we note, with regret, that the 1947 Council found it necessary to go outside the Municipality in order to fill the office of Village Clerk.

We have among our Veterans many who have sufficient qualifications to till these offices and we feel that in view of their service it is the obligation of our Municipal Councils to extend to our Veterans at least equal rights in obtaining employment and, where all things are equal, the Veterans should have preference.

We, therefore, call upon our incoming 1948 Council to rescind these appointments and to open up these positions for applications.
